# Forget church buildings get back to message

Dr. Oswald J. Smith, world-famous evangelist with 50 years of preaching behind him, delivered a spell-binding message to the annual meeting of the Acton Branch of the Canadian Bible Society in Knox Church, Sunday evening.

Paraphrasing the late Winston Churchill, he challenged the congregation and new officers of the Acton Society to "Give us the tools and we will finish the job."

"The Scripture message is dynamite!" he said, asserting it is time Christians started spreading it with the same enthusiasm as the Communists and Jehovah Witnesses propagate their respective faiths.

It is also time, he thundered, for the Christian church to forget about its emphasis on comfortable church buildings, and get back to the message of the Gospels.

The Apostle Paul, he thundered, never had the backing of a comfortable church building and he was the greatest missionary the world has ever seen.

### Communist gains

Dr. Smith, missionary statesman with a worldwide reputation, pointed to the Communists use of books for the sweeping gains they had made in undeveloped countries.

"I'll never forget what Mahatma Ghandi son told me," he said—"The missionaries taught us to read, but it was the Communists who gave us books."

It is time the Christian Church used the printed word in much the same way as the Communists and the Jehovah Witnesses do, he said.

There were 6,000 new churches built in the United States last year at a cost of one billion dollars.

What gains the cause of Christ would have made, he suggested if this money had gone into the printed page. The first actual church building wasn't built until 22AD, he pointed out.

Branding a glossy copy of the communist magazine USSR, Dr. Smith told the small

congregation that the magazine was available in every country of the world. "The Communists printed two pieces of literature for everyone in the world last year, he disclosed. What is wrong with the free world?"

Eighty-four million people in the world learn to read each year. "Why not give them the word of God," he asked, rather than the dictates of Marx.

"The pen is mightier than the voice," he said with emphasis.

Practices—preaches  
Dr. Smith does practice what he preaches. He has written 35 books which have had a circulation of over two million copies in 60 different languages. As a poet and hymn writer he has turned out 1200 hymns, poems and gospel songs. As an editor he has published a magazine for over 45 years.

The funeral was held at Longlaketon United Church, Tuesday, June 13 with interment in Longlaketon cemetery.

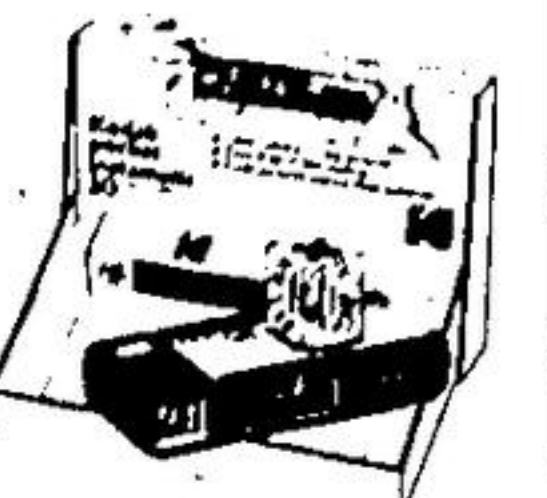

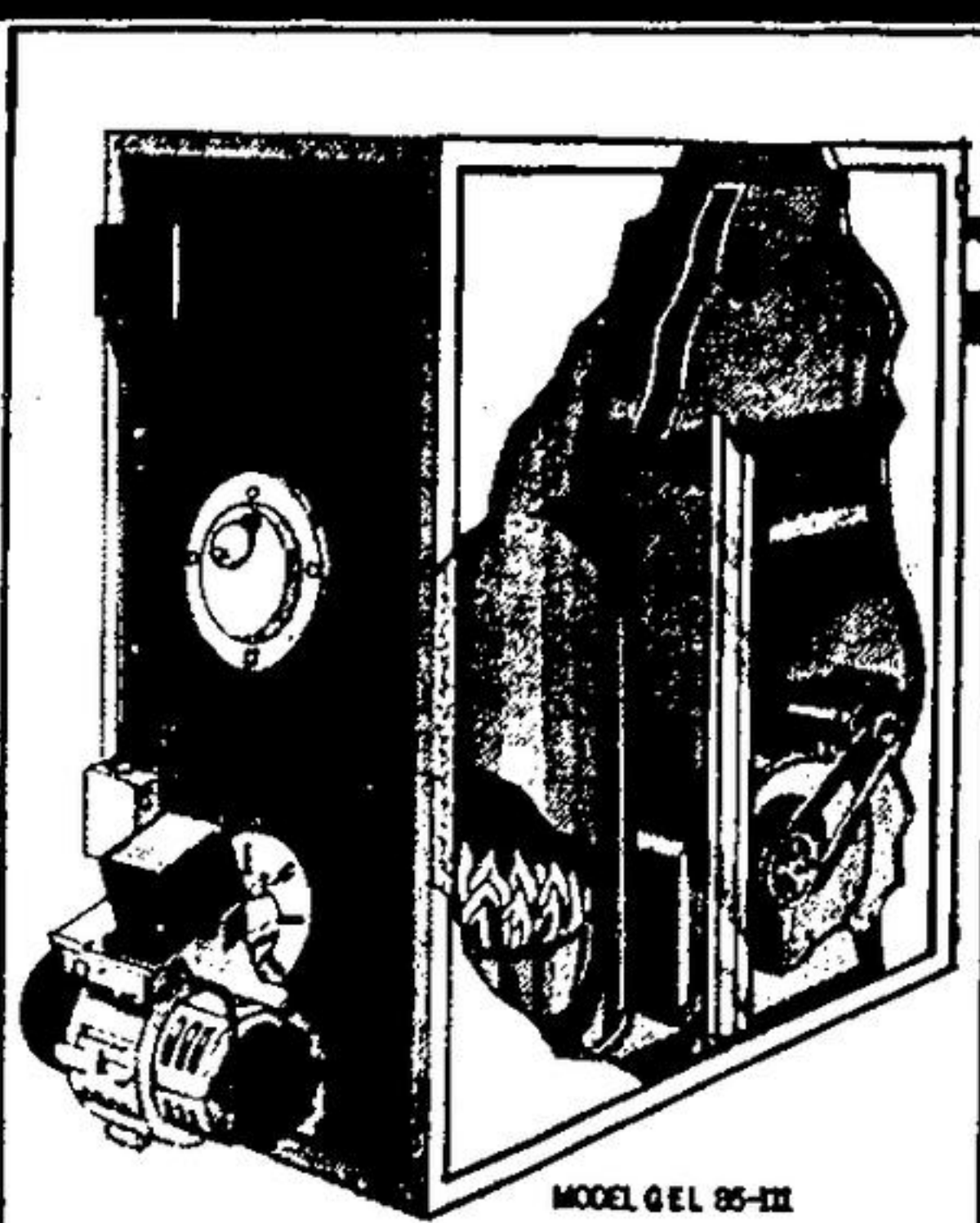
