She felt the clinic should be set up to treat the marginal income group. The committee turned the idea down when it was noted no provincial subsidy is forthcoming for dental treatment, only for prevention.

Dental director of Halton Health Unit Dr. Sam Green suggested the group of interested citizens could raise funds to pay for care in dentists' offices, which would save the cost of expensive equipment and machinery.

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
