Wallaceburg Red Devils engaged in a bit of third period devilry to steal a 15-14 Junior 'C' lacrosse win from Acton Rams here Monday night, but Ram manager Alan Hall believes demon spirits may also have been playing tricks with the scoreboards.

Missing from the game scoresheet was a second period goal, scored by Bruce Cooksley. Whether the goal was accidentally not recorded during the five minute Ram scoring spurge or whether it was credited to another Acton player was merely a matter of conjecture among Hall and referees Ron Finn and Murray Taylor when they got together after the game.

The missing goal, if indeed it was missing would have given Rams a tie and forced overtime, but in no way would have covered up for their surprising defensive collapse in the final frame. Rams led 11-7 at the end of the second period.

Roar back
Red Devils roared back to tie the

score 12-12 with 13 minutes left to play, and after Mike Marcoux gave Rams a two goal cushion with his 34th and 35 goals of the season, Wallaceburgh goalie Rick Dauw barred the door to the Red Devil cage for the final 11 minutes.

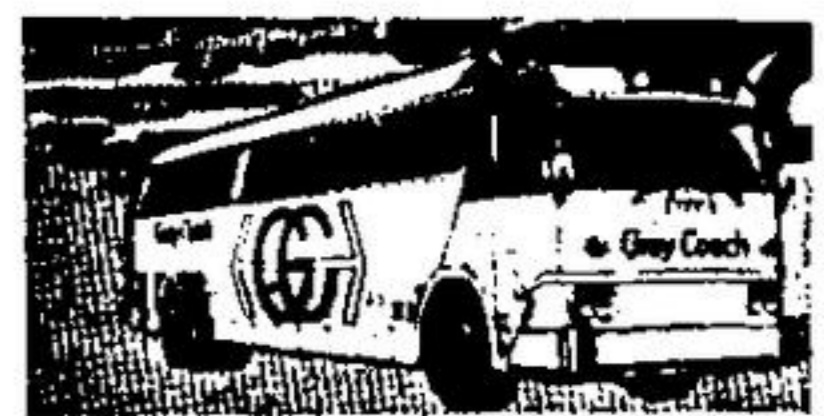
