

Summer library stocks over 6,000 varied books

Once again the great wide doors of Rockwood Centennial School will be open for all residents of Eramosa to attend the summer library.

Over 6,000 books will be available for children and adults to enjoy a variation of reading material extending from picture book level of the pre-schooler to the more advanced, higher level of adult requirements.

In charge Mary Holman, of Main Street, Rockwood, will be in charge of

the township library under the chief librarianship of Reta McPhedran. Mrs. McPhedran feels that Rockwood is fortunate to have Miss Holman acting in the capacity of assistant librarian as the young graduate teacher is presently enrolled and has completed one year of her library technician course.

National Geographic books on birds and animals, encyclopedias, fiction, non fiction, all areas of reading will be covered in the local library and the beginning

date opening has been set for Tuesday, July 4 to run through until the 30th of August.

Open periods for the summer project will be Tuesday to Thursday afternoons from 2 to 4:30 p.m. and, for the two evenings each week, Wednesday and Thursday from 7 to 9 p.m.

Can bring more "Come and see" is the invitation from the library staff who will welcome all interested readers to view the available material and, if more books are required to meet the needs of the community every effort will be made to provide.

The township library was started up three years ago with the Eramosa Recreation Committee working in conjunction with the Wellington County School Board and has, in the past, proved to be a highly successful function in the Eramosa community. As time progresses, it is hopeful that all residents will take advantage of its facilities to enjoy the literary means of escape from the mundanities of everyday living.
