Milton Heights bowling halted by twp. council

Use of outdoor bowling facilities on Milton Heights area property by members of the Italian-Canadian Club of Milton has been halted by Esqueping Council on the grounds that a change in land use resulted when the club decided to provide owner John Gazzola \$10 maintenance work per month for use of the property.

The township's holding by-law, passed in November 1969, prohibits any other use of land than what was taking place prior to the by-law.

Monday night, council also refused to grant club representative Lou Nadalin a week's postponement on the halt order which would allow him time to seek legal counsel and consultation.

Mr. Nadalin and Mr. Gazzola appeared at Monday night's council meeting, after the club received a letter informing them they were contravening the holding by-law. Reeve Tom Hill said council had not received a letter of complaint about the bowling, but that it had been brought to their attention by a resident.

No change
Nadalin claimed bowling was taking place at the Gazzola property as early as 1960. He suggested use of the land now is the same as it was then, even though members of the club are now using the facilities. He said the club has been a chartered social club since May of this year.

"It's not something we're starting new. The thing was always kept up," Nadalin told council.

Reeve Hill insisted the holding by-law was contravened because the land was changed from an agricultural use to a profit-making concern.

"The change was when you made it a chartered membership club. You can't charge people to come there," the reeve pointed out.

Nadalin replied that members are charged to belong to the club, not specifically for use of the bowling facilities.

He also said neighbors close by the property, who were consulted said they would not disrupt the bowling.

Hill said he'd been told Mr. Gazzola asked a neighbor if he would mind the club operating there for one year, but that he didn't ask for the second year.

"We have witnesses to say it was for more than one year," Nadalin replied.

Charges violation
Hill also charged the club with violating the township's building by-law by moving a bus on to the property for use as a clubhouse, after the original one burned down. When Nadalin said the bus is still mobile, the reeve

reminded him the township also has a by-law saying there will be no more trailers allowed.

Nadalin said the club only hoped to get this year's usage out of the facilities and that there wouldn't be a continuation of it at the site.

"The Italian-Canadian Club is just starting. It's not infringing on any other party or the Health Act," he stated.

Councillor Len Cox explained council is not against the club operating at the site, but that they must abide by the holding by-law.

"There are many others like you in the same boat. We're turning down a good many dollars in assessment here month after month," he said.

Heated discussion
Discussion between the parties became heated, when Hill charged that the club hasn't complied with any township rules or regulations whatsoever. He said club representatives should have come to council after the original building burned down.

"What number in the by-law have we broken then?" Nadalin questioned.

"The whole by-law," Hill roared back.

"If Mr. Gazzola invites his friends up there can you stop that?" Nadalin then asked.

Hill refused to answer yes or no to the question merely saying "You try it."

"What you're saying is you'll test us," Nadalin replied to the reeve. "There are four other councillors here. Don't you go on the majority vote in the democratic fashion?" he asked.

"You're out of line Lou when you start making accusations like that," Councillor Dick Howitt interjected in a firm tone. "The by-law is being breached and there's nothing that was said tonight to dispute this."

Deputy-reeve Russell Miller reminded Nadalin he admitted from the start Mr. Gazzola is receiving \$10 worth of maintenance work per month for use of the property.

"You also moved a bus in which is illegal. In my opinion the bus should be moved," he said.

"Can he or can he not invite friends up to bowl on his property?" Nadalin asked once again.

"In my opinion that's looking for a way around it and there just isn't a way around it," Councillor Cox offered.

Hill said he wouldn't "have words put in my mouth on that question," but Councillor Howitt, who is also a lawyer, said council could not stop friends from going to the property as long as it wasn't being done on a commercial basis.

Councillor Wilfrid Leslie remained silent throughout the entire discussion.

When Reeve Hill said there would be no postponement on the halt order and that the facilities were closed off as of now, Nadalin and Gazzola left the meeting with these parting words from Nadalin:

"You don't abide by the laws. You make your own rights and wrongs on it."
