

Grants amounting to \$27,500 for further development of the Rockwood Conservation Area have been approved by the Provincial Government, M.P.P. John Root announced this week.

Other grants of \$7,500 to Belwood Conservation area and \$16,500 for the Luther Marsh Conservation areas were unnounced in the same release.

In the Rockwood Area the Grand River Authority intends to proceed with further development work. This work will include construction of service roads and parking area, tree planting, fish and wildlife development, ground improvements including campsite development, removal of dead and diseased trees, nature trail development and landscaping, construction of the 4th Line Road diversion and other general development work including fencing, provision of additional picnic facilities, sanitary con-veniences, erection of signs etc.
