

Intercounty dream game set for Rockwood park

Three players from the league-leading Hespeler club are among nine starters picked for the first annual Intercounty Fastball league all-star game slated for Rockwood Park, tomorrow Thursday night at 8.30.

Catcher Pete Market, first baseman Dan Donahue and second sacker Stan Hardman were named to the dream team which will face the defending league champion Rockwood Seniors.

Also chosen were pitcher John Holby and third baseman Ray Inglis of Georgetown, shortstop Wayne Kirk and left fielder Ed White of Belwood, centre fielder Jim Frank of Glen Williams and right fielder Lloyd Manderson of Fergus.

Complete roster
Coaches Ron Ritchie of Glen Williams and Art Bruce of Hespeler filled out their roster this week with the selection of seven alternates, pitchers Jake Ney of Hespeler and Dave Farrelly of Glen Williams, catcher Max

Stafford of Glen Williams, infielders Brian Peavoy of Georgetown and Paul Teeter of Glen Williams and outfielders John Cunningham of Hillsburgh and Rick Peavoy of Georgetown. The cellar-dwelling Acton Pete's Barber Shop club will be the only one not represented in the all-star

game. Asked for a prediction, coach Ritchie told the Free Press, "With a lineup like that, there's no reason why we can't beat them. These guys are supposed to be the best ballplayers in the league."

All-star hurlers face the

unenviable task of trying to silence the booming bats of village power hitters like Steve Redmond, Harry Barber and Chick Milne.

Rockwood playing coach John Salmon said he won't name his starting pitcher until shortly before game time tomorrow night.
