Boy dives onto rocks falls now "off limits"

"Off limits" is the new ruling at the Valley Road falls in the Rockwood Conservation Park these days since last Saturday's accident resulting in a Burlington boy splitting his head from the arch of his nose to the middle of his skull.

Despite constant warnings from park officials, swimmers insist on using the hazardous hole as their favorite diving area and

usually during the summer months several such incidents occur.

Taken to hospital
Saturday's accident was the deciding factor, however, and Superintendent Jim Muir is posting signs barring the falls for all further swimming.

The Burlington lads were camping in the district having bicycled from home the previous

Friday evening. Diving into the rocky pool, Gary Owens, 14, hit a rock head on, gashing his head wide open, and, rushed to the Guelph hospital in the Conservation truck, was treated and given stitches.

The Park management notified his parents in Burlington and he was returned home after hospital release.

Summer school classes in Fergus

Eramosa summer school students can go to the Fergus summer school by Board of Education bus with a route that originates in Erin and collects students from Rockwood and John F. Ross C.V.I.

Two other Wellington County Bus routes makes collections at Harriston, Mount Forest and Arthur for one, with another commencing at Centennial CVI and making pick-ups at Blashop Macdonell and the G.C.V.I.

In Fergus
Wellington County's summer school began on Monday at Centre Wellington District High School, Fergus. Preliminary registration was for 225 students with Mervin Hawsdrauser of Arthur the summer school principal appointed by the county board of education. Two types of programs are

being offered for the first time. One program is for credit which involves four hour's work per day to accomplish the necessary total of stipulated hours in accordance with the ministry of education.

The credit courses are offered in art, typing, the man in the society program, and second year mathematics.

Upgrade standings
Other courses are designed to enable students to upgrade their standing and they will last two hours per day. The first-year courses are in mathematics, science, English, history, typing and geography with second-year courses consisting of science, mathematics, English and typewriting. Some last minute placements are still available according to Mr. Hawsdrauser for students making late registration.
