Reeve pushes for member on board of education

Nassagaweya Reeve Mrs. A. MacArthur will embark on a campaign to acquire a trustee for the Township of Nassagaweya on the Halton County Board. Halton County treasurer Jim McQueen reported county representation under legislation set out would be the same as last year. Acton and Nassagaweya share one member while Georgetown,

Equising and Milton all have one each. Burlington has eight of the 18 public school representatives on the board.

At County Council Wednesday Mrs. MacArthur suggested her township would have had faster service in straightening the equalization factor out if they had a representative on the board. She suggested and received support from Equising Deputy Reeve Russ Miller that Acton will always choose the representative as long as the two are lumped.

Forget boundaries
Warden Jim Swanborough told council it was necessary to forget

municipal boundaries in a one tier system like the board of education has. "Call it Acto-weya if you like but you have to look at it as an area not a town or township," he said.

After the meeting Reeve MacArthur said she would bring the matter up in Nassagaweya Council before discussing it any further at the county level.

Acton Reeve Frank Oakes said legislation only permitted 18 public school representatives on the board and if Nassagaweya had one of their own it would have to be a 36 man board to keep the representation in balance.

New collector SPIN asks support

Reeve Anne MacArthur of Nassagaweya and Mrs. June Andrews, one of the organizers of the SPIN (Stop Pollution in Nassagaweya) group, intend to approach the Minister of the Environment James Auld, for a provincial grant for SPIN.

The proposed move by the two Nassagaweya ladies came about after members of SPIN appeared at a meeting of council last week. A spokesman for the group, John Chapman of R.R. 1, Campbellville asked councillors if they were willing to back SPIN's bid for a grant from either the federal or provincial governments. The speaker said a grant could greatly help the ecology group.

Too late
Chapman said it was too late for the group to apply for the Opportunities for Youth Program or the Local Initiatives Plan, but that perhaps SPIN could be incorporated under the summer SWEEP (Students Working in an Enhanced Environment) project. SWEEP is a summer work project for high school and university students operated by Halton Region Conservation Authority.

"In the Borough of Etobicoke the pollution group there works with the local SWEEP plan," pointed out Chapman. He also said working with SWEEP would be good because teenagers are its main backbone, "and lets face it this country belongs to the teenagers," he emphasized.

A grant could be used to employ teenagers to help with collecting SPIN's material, added Chapman. The delegate said SPIN's present volunteers weren't slowing down, but could use the help of some paid teenage help. It might give some young people valuable employment, he added.

However, councillors knocked the idea of applying for a sweep grant. "SWEEP is so transient the students who only work for the summer," remarked Reeve MacArthur. Councillor Art Gagnier said it would be better apply for permanent grant and to forget SWEEP.

May be eligible
Mrs. MacArthur then suggested SPIN might be eligible for a grant from the Ministry of the Environment. She said she would gladly petition the Minister, James Auld, if SPIN worker Mrs. June Andrews would help her. Mrs. Andrews, one of the members of the delegation, agreed to do so.

The question of using teenage help came into focus, when one woman with the SPIN delegation, suggested council it would be willing to use some money, it had contemplated using for building a new shed, as remuneration for teenagers.

"I thought the volunteer situation was good," queried Mrs. MacArthur.

"Yes, but there's a lot of work involved in sorting the paper we receive," Chapman pointed out. Employing teenagers did not win any favor with Councillor Gibson. "Once we start hiring teenagers we're into a whole can of worms—such as paying compensation for injuries. I'm not objecting to the money, but the township could be in for a lot of trouble."

Might volunteer
"Teenagers are usually willing to volunteer if they know the philosophy; look at the miles for millions walks," observed Councillor Jim Watson.

Chapman then asked Council if they would be willing to pay for newspaper advertising and high school brochures requesting volunteer teenage help. "We need publicity," he stated.

Council said it would have to put some thought into the matter before making a decision. In addition to asking Council's help in obtaining some form of grant, the speaker requested an extension of the \$25 a month subsidy it contributes to the operating expenses of SPIN's truck driver-collector.

The \$25 month allowance was needed to attract offers for the task, explained the delegate. Recently Basil McDonald, of R.R. 6, Milton, who had collected SPIN's collections on the first of each month, resigned because of other responsibilities.

Subsidy
In January councillors had agreed to a six month \$25 a month subsidy after SPIN spokesmen said the operating expense of one month's collection was \$100, but that \$75 could be recovered from the sale of the reusable material. McDonald had been making the collections and storing the material in his barn until he had time to dispose of it.

A new man, Peter Forbes of Hamiltonville, would be taking on the job, stated Chapman. Council agreed to extend the subsidy to the end of 1972.

SPIN's collection of recyclable garbage will be kept in Chapman's barn, until there is enough material stockpiled to make trips to factory depots worthwhile, Chapman told the legislators.
