

Barber shop bats boom, experts dine on words

Prognosticators who voiced the opinion back in May that Pete's Barber Shop just plain weren't good enough for the Intercounty Fastball league are eating their words now, as the barbers continue to pull the carpet out from underneath pennant contenders.

Latest victims of the red-hot barber shop crew are the defending league champion Rockwood Seniors who succumbed 9-8 in the ninth inning here Sunday night, after posting a 6-1 win over Acton in Rockwood Thursday night.

The win was the fourth in the last six games for Acton and gave them a 7-14 won-lost record for the season. Barbers dropped their first nine games. Rockwood are now in third place with an 11-6 record.

Peck away
Trailing 7-1 in the third inning of Sunday night's game, barbers kept pecking away at the Rockwood lead and finally stole the win in the bottom of the ninth, when Rockwood centre fielder Gord Burnett just failed to come up with a shoe string catch on a bases loaded liner by Eric "Shoe" Lacey.

With one out Ed Phillips doubled and scored the tying run, when brother Harry, the Rockwood rightfielder misjudged John Dunn's long drive and let it drop for a triple.

Rockwood playing coach John Salmon then ordered the next two Acton batters Fred Buchanan and Dave Husson walked intentionally to set up a force play at all bases.
Bruce Thomason lined out to second baseman Steve Redmond, who just missed doubling Buchanan off second base for the out which would have ended the inning just before Lacey stroked

his game winning single.
A 17 hit assault on fireballer Bob "Shaw" and a neat relief pitching job by Ed Phillips paved the way for the Acton comeback.

Phillips sharp
Toeing the slab in the third inning, Phillips held the villagers to just four hits and two runs the

rest of the way. He struck out six batters and walked only two. Rockwood tagged starter Grant Usher and his replacement Eric "Shoe" Lacey for six runs, including a three run homer by Mike Kelly in the first two innings. Five of the runs came as a result of Acton infield errors by

Jan Riddall and Denis Gibbons. First sacker John Dunn tagged Shaw for a pair of doubles, a single and a triple to earn game hitting honors. Ed Phillips, Jan Riddall and Bob Andrews all singled three times. Jim Bullough singled and doubled, and Dave Husson and Eric

"Shoe" Lacey each singled once. Tom Racola and Mike Martin had two hits apiece for Rockwood. One of Racola's safeties was a triple.

Dynamic duo
Salmon and Shaw combined to set the barbers down on five hits, while fanning 10 in Rockwood

Thursday night.
Rockwood scored twice in the fifth on base hits by Harry Phillips, Martin Dupuis and Salmon and a ground out. Acton narrowed the count with a single tally in the top of the seventh, when Fred Buchanan and Bill Anderson hit safely.
Doubles by Mike Kelly, Harry Barber and Norm Beattie and a triple by Mike Martin highlighted a four run Rockwood seventh inning.
Harry Barber paced a 10 hit Rockwood attack with a double and a triple in five at bats. Jim Bullough belted a pair of three baggers for Acton. Losing pitcher was Ed Phillips.

Barbers make their next start against Helwood, here tomorrow (Thursday) night and play Georgetown in Glen Williams, Friday night, August 4. Rockwood plays in Fergus tonight (Wednesday) and back home against Hillsburgh tomorrow (Thursday) night.

Four teams vie for ticket to Edmonton

An all expense paid trip to Edmonton to represent Ontario in the National Junior Lacrosse Championship for the Founders Cup awaits the winner of this weekend's four team O.L.A. Junior "C" tournament at the community centre.

Acton Rams, last year's provincial champs are the darkhorses in the four team field. Rams, who won only five of 20 league games this year face Windsor Warlocks second place finishers in the seven team league in the tournament opener Saturday morning at 11.

Long Branch PCO's, pennant winners in the Junior "C" league take on Brookville Essos last year's Ontario finalists in the second game at 2 in the afternoon. Brockville won eight out of 20 regular season games in the Eastern Ontario Junior "B" league, then swept Cobourg of the Central loop two straight in a special playoff series last weekend.

Tournament championship game is slated for Sunday afternoon at 2 following the Rams-Sabres Gay Nineties dance and fun night, which is being held in the community centre Saturday night.
