What we do to the potatoes we eat

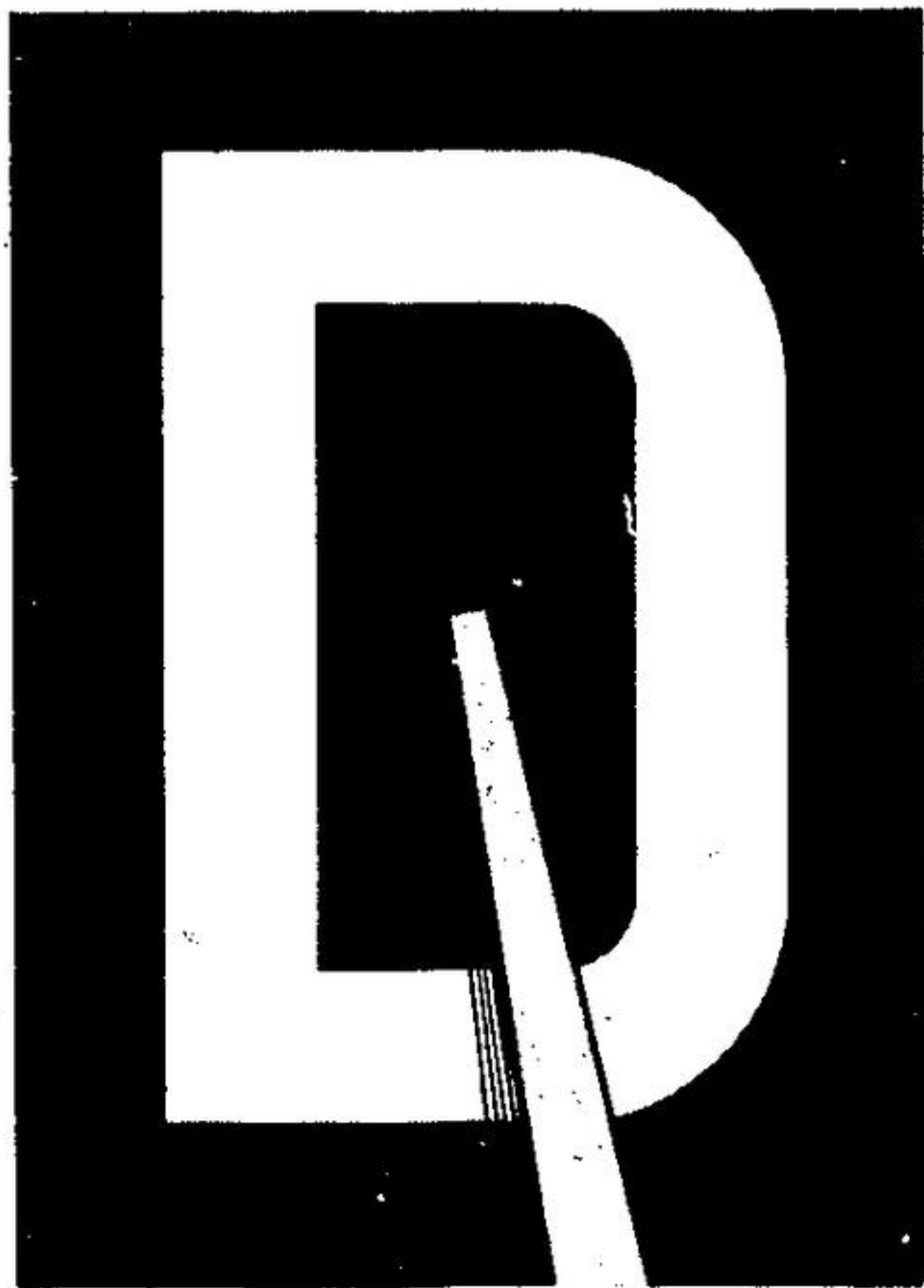
If the potatoes are peeled and boiled, 47 to 50 per cent of their vitamin C is lost.

Another 10 per cent of the vitamin C is lost if they are mashed.

Some of the vitamin B group are lost if potatoes are soaked.

If potatoes are peeled, soaked, boiled, and riced, 83 per cent of the iron and all of the vitamin C are lost.

Potatoes maintain most of their value when baked in their skins. To save the vitamin C loss when a potato is cut open, chill it thoroughly first. If you have to cut a potato ahead of cooking time, put the pieces in an airtight bag and return them to the refrigerator.
