## Fall at Niagara fatal to Russell Hunter, 11

A fall on a plenie at Niagara tragically took the life of 11-yearold Russell Wayne Hunter last week. The son of Shirley and Brydon Hunter, 55 Longfield Rd., was with his family when he apparently lost his footing and tumbled down a rocky path Thursday, striking his head.

He was taken by ambulance to Niagara hospital, transferred to St. Catharines to a neurosurgeon, but died the next morning of massive brain damage.

The lad did not regain consciousness.

#### Contact police

The two women then decided to contact Milton police chief Ray Andress at home. He joined them in their car and they went to the J.M. Denyes school grounds where the women had last seen the pair.

The youths started to run when they saw them approaching but stopped when they saw one of them was a police officer.

"I'suppose the three of them walked back to the station because the police chief waved us on," Mrs. Harkley said.

Milton police have charged the two youths apprehended with theft over \$200. Damages to the cars and fence totalled \$1,500, \$500 of which was inflicted on the fence and another \$500 to the Arbic car. Larry Arbic is a former resident of Acton.
