Comfortably settled in the United church parsonage are the new minister Dr. William George Onions, Mrs. Onions and their multi-colored cat Wuzzy. With the For Sale sign on the lawn indicating the congregation's decision to offer the house to a possible buyer, the couple are aware they might have to change their home while they're in Acton. Meanwhile they enjoy the space of the old house.

They have come here from a year in New Brunswick, where Dr. Onions had four country churches outside Fredericton.

Bermuda church
Before that they were in Bermuda. Not many people here realize there are five churches in Bermuda belonging to the United Church of Canada. Dr. Onions points out.

During his ministry he has been at Oxford United church in

Winnipeg, 10 years in Montreal and two years in Toronto. They also had a year abroad.

Ties with Winnipeg
They still have many ties with Winnipeg.

He was born there, but was brought up in England. Mrs. Onions was born in England - near Acton - and grew up in Winnipeg. They were married there.

They have two children, a son and daughter, both at Winnipeg. Their son, Sergt. David Onions, is with the air wing of the Canadian Armed Forces. Their daughter is Mrs. Joan O'Brien of Winnipeg. There are ten grandchildren - five in each family.

Three degrees
Dr. Onions received his B.A. degree at the University of Manitoba, his B.D. at Edinburgh and his Doctor of Theology degree at Emmanuel college,

University of Toronto. While in Toronto, he was assistant minister at Timothy Eaton Memorial church and drove up to St. Marys as supply minister.

At one time he was army padre with the Fort Garry Horse, Second Army Division. "Never saw a horse," comments Dr. Onions. "Just tanks." He is also an ex-Legion padre.

Wuzzy?
Their playful cat Wuzzy also comes from Manitoba, where they found him as an unwanted but very appealing kitten. Wuzzy a male or female? They didn't know what Wuzzy was...but with them Wuzzy went.

Dr. and Mrs. Onions are finding their welcome in town very warm and friendly, with members of the congregation and neighbors coming to the door to bid them welcome.

Dr. Onions is taking the joint United-Presbyterian services this month.

My husband and I have just returned from two weeks' holiday spent in the Espanola area. We found two Free Presses waiting for us on our return, containing the reports about Acton main street.

We were very interested in the comments made by both the businessmen and the shoppers, but feel a much better report could have been obtained by a house to house visit. The comments would have been much more varied, and I would like to add my own personal comments about shopping in Acton.

I feel very strongly that if one lives in a town one should support its tradespeople, but there are many times in Acton when it is not possible to obtain the goods one needs, due to I'm afraid to the shortsightedness and apathy of some of the local tradespeople. There are exceptions to these of course, and I should like to mention a couple of them by name. I have always found Mr. Hinton and his staff (at least most of them) very helpful, obliging and open to suggestions for

improvement. Also Mr. Symon of Symon Hardware, and the management and staff of Foodland.

We were very sorry to see one local men's wear store close. They carried a good quality type of merchandise and would order anything for you if they didn't carry it in stock. This is a store that will be really sadly missed.

Now, how could it be improved? A coat of paint, a general clean up of weedy patches, and other areas, and a smile and kind word for the general public, and for goodness sake get rid of the terrible odor that pervades Acton and surrounding area most of the time. I often wondered why Actonians went about with the look of someone with a nasty smell under their noses, it wasn't very long before we found out why! and this year has been the worst ever.

Personally, I am tired of hearing all the excuses put out by the management of Beardmore, and the air pollution board, too. Please do something constructive, so that Actonians can be happy and sweet tempered, and breathe sweet smelling clean air.

Espanola, incidentally, is a town very similar to Acton in many ways, it even has a small problem from the paper mill, but the town itself is a much better planned one, with a lovely wide four lane main street. The population is only a few hundred more than Acton, but I would suggest that Acton could learn a lesson from Espanola when it comes to planning.

The town that impressed us most while we were away, was Elliott Lake, well planned, clean and the air was like nectar, so clear and free from pollution. A few more towns like this in Canada would be wonderful.

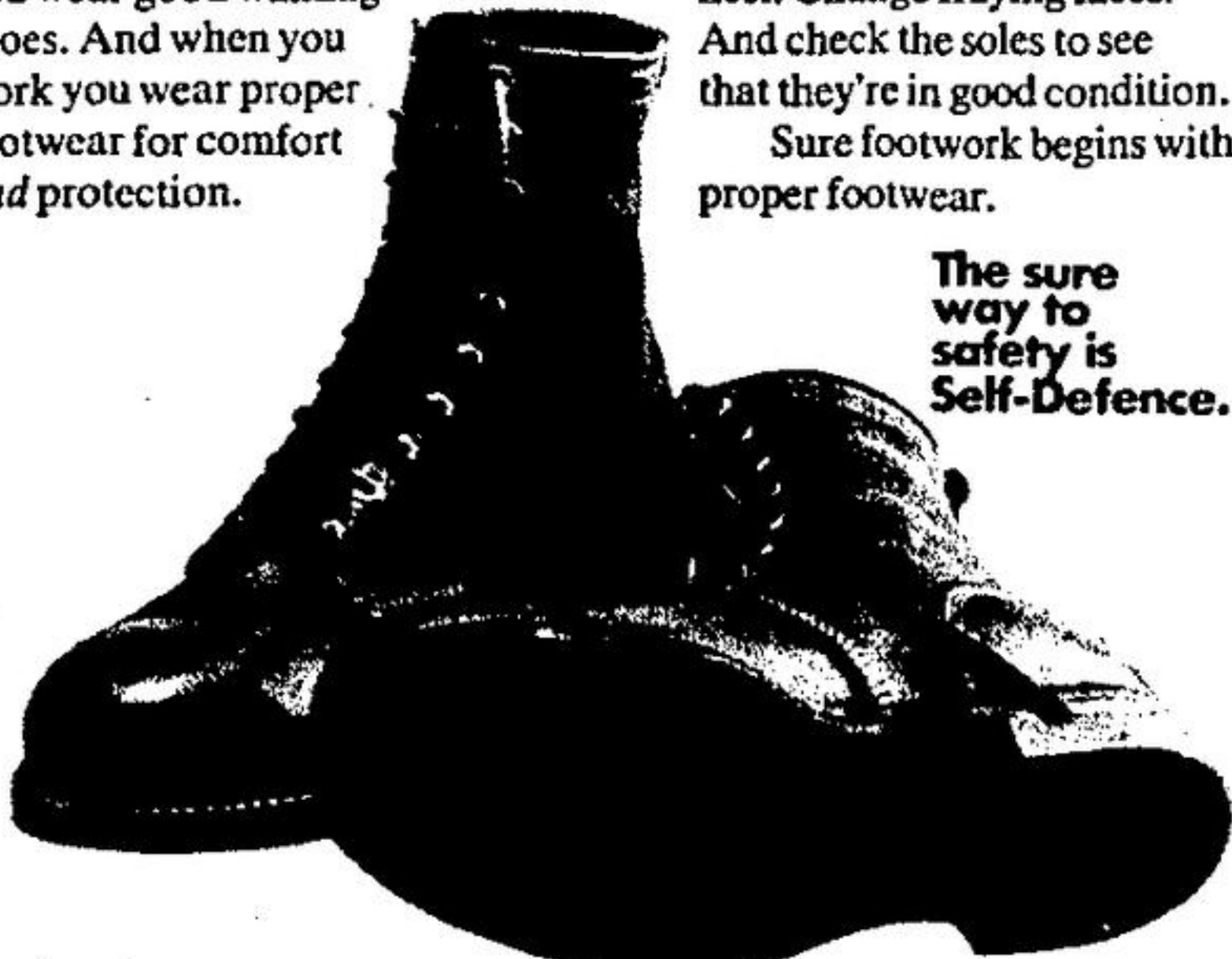
