

Roadrunners fourth after shutout win

Acton Family Pool Roadrunners are now tied for fourth place with Campbellville in the Halton County midget "B" baseball loop, after defeating Bramalea 5-0 Thursday night. Acton bowled 10-9 in another game in Burlington Sunday afternoon.

Acton jumped on Bramalea pitcher Carl Milligan for three runs in the first inning. Glen McKenzie highlighted the inning driving in two runs with a bases loaded single.

Acton then made the score 5-0, as they scored two more runs in the third inning.

With only one out to go in the game, the Bramalea coach mysteriously pulled his team off the field.

Jeff Ribble pitched a brilliant game for Acton. He yielded only two hits in recording the shutout. In Burlington, the locals played one of the most exciting games of the year, with the host team

squeaking by 10-9 in 11 innings. Roadrunners trailed 9-4 at one stage of the game.

Roadrunners refused to give up, as they pecked away at Burlington pitching for three runs in the eighth inning.
