240 register for Shorthorn day

The annual field day of Ontario Shorthorn Club and Ontario Shorthorn Lassie Association had 240 people registering recently at Scotsdale Farm, owned by Mr. and Mrs. S. G. Bennett. The weather was perfect - the cattle, barns, paddocks and lawns were in top condition - Scotsdale hospitality was at its best.

Allan McKinley of Blenheim, president of Ontario Shorthorn Club, was in charge of the day's program, which included Lex Rutherford, associate director, Live Stock Branch, Toronto, as main speaker following the noon lunch hour. He stressed the good qualities of Shorthorn cattle, in both Scotch Shorthorns and Dual Purpose Shorthorns, particularly their inherent traits of docility, fertility and mothering ability - and predicted these are traits that will always be required in successful beef cattle operations.

Mr. Bennett had donated a Scotsdale heifer, born May 20, 1971, sired by Scotsdale Tehran, to be sold at auction at the Field Day, gross proceeds of which were to go to Ontario Shorthorn Club. Many breeders bid; and in a short time auctioneer Bert Pepper had sold her to Bodmin Farms Ltd. (Ross, Chas. and George Procter) Brussels, Ont. at \$800.

Runners-up were S. E. Griffin & Son, Acton, and also Mrs. W. G. Pitfield, Saraguay Farm, Montreal.

Also adding to Club funds was the sale of two lots of semen, (5 vials each) from the noted Polled Shorthorn bull, Gloriadale

Meteor 5th, at \$45 and \$40., to Allan A. Cook, Springloam Farms, Milton, and to George D. Brown, Glenrothes Farm, Beaverton. The semen was donated by the three owners of the bull - Gloriadale Farm, Fort Hope; Ken Gunter, Trenton; and George Couch, Perth, Ont.

Weight guessing of Scotsdale Tehran (2,338 lbs.), judging of classes of eight cows and their young calves, and 8 yearling bulls from the Scotsdale herd, with good prizes to all winners, concluded a very successful event.

The ladies of the Lassie Association, of which Mrs. George D. Brown is president, had a successful booth, and added greatly to the interest of the day's program.

Bennett, Georgetown for classes of Arabian Mares and Shorthorn Bulls, then went to the Anthony farm at Acton for Suffolk Rams, Holstein Cows and a class of Yorkshire Sows, provided by T.J. Brownridge of Georgetown.

The competition was under the leadership of Nino Braida, president of Halton 4-H Club Leaders. Other leaders assisting as judges were Bert Stewart, Bill Lasby, Jeff Nurse, Albert Hunter and Stan May.

38 Contestants

The winner of the junior section with 38 contestants was Jim Summerfield with 276 points out of a possible 300; second was Lindsay Knight with 275 points; third was a tie with Cheryl Buchanan with 274 points and Johanna Popp with 274 points; and fifth was Bob Allison with 272

points. The winner of the intermediate section with 25 contestants was Peter May with 448 points out of a possible 500, second was Bruce McGee with 443 points, third was Stephen Stanley with 442 points, fourth was Barbara Brown with 439 points, and the fifth place winner was Brent Coulson with 438 points.

The winner of the senior section with 23 contestants was Ken McNabb, 475 points; second, Cathy Lasby with 468 points; third was Murray Brownridge with 466 points; fourth was Dave McKinnon with 464 points; and fifth was Bill Stokes with 462 points.

The seed Judging Competition was held for 4-H and junior farmer members at Master Feeds Research Farm, Georgetown. Members placed classes of soybeans, oats, barley, potatoes and hay, giving reasons on the last three classes. They also had to identify 20 forage plants and weeds and answer a quiz.

In the junior section, for those 12 and under, the winner was Marilyn McNabb with 397 points out of a possible 550. Dale Wickson was second with 375 points.

In the intermediate section, for those 13 and 14, the winner was Joanne Wilson with 421 points; second was Gary Patterson with 415 points; and third was Karen Wickson with 412 points.

In the senior section for those 15 and over the winner was Ken McNabb 497 points; second was Murray Brownridge with 483 points; third Lorne Wilson with 465 points; fourth Cathy Lasby 451 points; and fifth Dennis McClure 441 points.
