# All set for 3-day Sportsmen's Show

All is set for the three day Acton sportsmen's show but the weather, and the town's five service clubs sponsoring the event anticipate it will also cooperate.

The show starts off Friday night with the Oktoberfest celebration at the arena to the music of Nick Osbell's German Band.

Saturday a parade will assemble at the station at 12.30 p.m. and led by the town band and the Bramalea Lions minibikes will lead a procession of decorated bicycles and floats from the minor baseball and soccer.

This leads to a bicycle rally in the park operated by the Ontario Provincial Police. Two CCM bicycles have been donated by the CCM company for the winning boy and girl. Registration forms for this event are available from now until noon Saturday.

Also on the program—soccer game, baseball game, scuba demonstration, tug-of-war, horseshoe pitching, and movies.

At night there will be a Millionaires' Night, dancing to the Shaynes in the community centre and as a bonus for those interested in the Canada-Russia hockey game, color TV is being provided by the First Line TV.

Sunday the community centre will be the scene of Canada's largest antique gun show from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the afternoon. There will also be a baseball game with TV personalities and M.P.'s taking part, and movies.

A fishing derby is planned for the entire weekend with a prize for the longest fish caught. It will be awarded Sunday afternoon.

In parting Mr. Patterson offered a few suggestions for the committee's future consideration.

He suggested members be limited to serving two years on sub-committees and recommended the use of more citizens on sub-committees. The Charlie Thomson Memorial Trophy committee is a good example of this, he said.

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## Use mobile house burned?

A request from the administration committee of Acton council that planning board consider an amendment to the zoning by-law which would allow the use of mobile homes on the property when one's home has been destroyed by fire and is being rebuilt, was sent back to the committee for more information.

Planning board discussed the request and agreed they should have more information on the legalities of mobile homes in town and an example of how existing by-laws could legislate against them.

"A by-law may not be necessary," said Norm Elliott, one of three council representatives on the board.

"What's to stop people from parking trailers in their driveways now?"

It becomes a residence then, the mayor insisted. Let's turn it back to council for some direction regarding trailers before this board decides.

There should be a time limit on something like this and rules flexible enough to assist people to rebuild, said Lou Bonnette.

Chairman Sid Saitz wondered whether it was a good idea since most people have insurance coverage which guarantees accommodation if their home burns down. He doubted many people would go to the expense of buying a mobile home while rebuilding.
