Q.P.P. report

Thefts, four disturbances

During the reporting week of August 20 to August 27 the officers of the Acton Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police, investigated a total of 28 general occurrences and two motor vehicle collisions.

Of the general occurrences investigated there were five thefts reported, four disturbances, three liquor law violations, one break and enter and one stolen vehicle. The remainder of the general occurrences were of a minor nature and required little police action.

Of the five reported thefts, three have been brought to successful conclusions. A local man was charged as the result of

an investigation into the theft of gas from parked vehicles. Investigation is presently being conducted in regards to a break and enter at a private residence.

Four Disturbances
All four disturbances reported were concluded and required little police action.

As the result of investigating the three liquor law violations, six local youths were charged with 'Minor Consuming' and one local man was charged with 'Having liquor in a place other than residence'.

The two motor vehicle collisions reported were both hit and runs. There were no injuries in either collision and

investigations have not yet been concluded.

A farmer on one of Esquesing's few remaining century farms, John Brown Devereaux, 81, died in Georgetown hospital, August 11.

Mr. Devereaux was born on the 7th Line farm, near the Maple Avenue corner which was granted his ancestors by the crown over 100 years ago. He was the son of Walter and Mary Ann Brown Devereaux, and both parents were descendants of United Empire Royalists.

After attending Stewarttown school, he took up farming. His riding horses were popular with generations of young people. His interest in farming extended to attendance at district fall fairs and the Royal Winter Fair, which he visited nightly for years.

A bachelor, his closest relative is a cousin, Harry R. Brown, R.R. 5, Milton. He was predeceased by a brother Willie and sisters Mrs. Laura Miller and Mrs. Elsie Murdoch.

Rev. Kelvin Johnston conducted the funeral service at the McClure-Jones Funeral Home and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. Pallbearers were Clarence Carey, George Burt, Ted Brown, Percy Barker, Allen Devereaux, Freulton and Jim Emmerson, Brampton.
