
Toronto Globe and Mail, April 24, 1970 describes the Black Creek as "foul" and continued saying "Acton had a dismal year in 1969 with a coliform average of 1,450,000, but 1970 should be better. An extension to the treatment plant is in operation, and sand filtration beds soon will be operating. Last year's poor showing was the result of construction difficulties at the

Some residents remember when the Black Creek was teeming with brook trout. In the 1940's a retaining wall at Beardmore broke, spilling effluent from the filter beds into the creek killing most of the fish.

The recent revitalization of the creek, has led people to hope the waters may soon be a lively fishing stream again.

A spokesman for the Credit Valley Conservation area said he has never seen the creek looking

Author Jim Henderson, a frequent critic of waste in the water, has also said the creek has improved greatly this year. The stream runs through his R.R. 4 Acton home.


