

The Halton Presbytery church grounds, 6th Line Nassagaweya was the scene of the first National Trail Horse Championships sponsored by the Rockwood Trail Riders on Sunday.

Meter cards

The unsatisfactory system of estimated billing will soon be climinated for Rockwood hydro consumers.

Village secretary L. P. Hockey told the Free Press this week that as soon as cards can be printed the meter reading card system will be introduced.

Ratepayers who are not at home when the meter reader calls will be able to pencil in the position of the hands on the meter on a card, which the meter reader will leave at the door. Cards may then be deposited in the mail slot at the hydro office.

Previously, hydro consumption. was estimated when ratepayers were not home when the reader called. Mr. Hockey said one unfortunate resident had his consumption estimated three times in succession.

Ontario is now putting together the biggest municipal enumeration in its history.

Without you it won't be right.



This is an election year for municipal councils, school boards and other local bodies in most of Ontario. An early step in these elections is the documenting of voters' lists. To assemble voters' lists we need to make an enumeration. This is done by the Province for each municipality.

But our municipal enumeration involves more than

just voters' lists. It helps determine the division of education property taxes between the public and separate school systems. It lets the Province more fairly distribute grants to local governments to help reduce municipal tax bills. And it also helps provide us with an accurate population count.

Collecting nearly 8 million names and addresses, as you can imagine, is a big job. The

Province is employing 8,000 people to visit every residence in Ontario. When the government representative knocks on your door, the procedure is simple. The enumeration notice is pre-printed by computer with the names of every-

one currently on record in your household. If you agree that the information is correct and complete, you simply sign the notice. If there are changes, such as an addition to the family, corrections are made on the spot, verified and signed by you or any other adult in your household. If you are not home the notice is left, together with simple instructions. You mail

it, postage free, only if there are changes. You will be counted sometime between September 5th and 18th.

The Municipal Enumeration: September 5-18. Without you it won't be right.
