# Sharon Britton Halton rep 4-H United Nations tour

A trip to Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, highlighted the bus tour taken by 43 4-H Junior Farmers from across Ontario. Halton County's representative on the United Nations tour was Sharon Britton of R.R. 1, Acton, an employee of the Toronto Dominion Bank in Acton.

The cost of Sharon's trip was paid by the Halton Women's Institute. Representatives were chosen on the basis of experience and must have been a member of the 4-H club for at least three years.

The bus trip originated at the Peterborough Memorial Centre and picked Sharon and other delegates up at the GO station at

the Guelph Line and the QE Way last Saturday morning.

On to battlefield

First night was spent at the Pennsylvania State University then on to Gettysburg the next morning. After a tour of the historic Civil War battlefield the group was bused across Maryland to Washington, D.C. 4-H centre in Washington was the headquarters for group tours in and around the city. The Junior Farmers saw the Capitol, Washington monument, Arlington cemetery, Lincoln memorial, Smithsonian Institute and took a tour of the FBI building.

Moving on to New York City

they stayed at the Piccadilly Hotel. They visited the United Nations, where a talk with a Canadian delegate about what Canada was doing at the UN was a highlight and explained why the bus trip was called the United Nations tour.

While in New York the group took a tour of the city and saw the Broadway production of the play "No, No Nanette".

Sharon told this newspaper most of the time was spent on the bus but she did enjoy the large amount of free time they were granted.

Miss Britton was very interested in the FBI building and said she would like to return to Gettysburg someday.

## Highest record in Halton

The 1971 Record of Performance reports have been received for the 74 dairy herds in Halton. The report lists the breed class average or BCA for milk and butterfat for each of these herds.

In the Holstein section, the winner was Fred Nurse, R.R. 2, Georgetown, with BCA's of 157 for milk and 163 for fat. His 26 cows averaged 17,430 pounds of milk, 864 of fat, 3.81 per cent test. This milk production is the highest ever recorded on R.O.P. in Halton County. This is the fifth time that Fred Nurse has won top honors in the county for Holsteins.

Runner-up was H. C. Reid, Milton, with BCA's of 151 and 157. His 44 records averaged 16,004 milk and 622 fat. In third position was W. J. Proud, 3369 Burnhamthorpe Rd. Oakville, with BCA's of 155 and 150 on 21 records. In fourth position was Dr. T. J. Molony, R.R. 4, Milton, with BCA's of 153 and 149 on 24 records. In fifth position was J. C. Reid, R.R. 2, Georgetown with BCA's of 148 and 153 on 38 records.

19 records with BCA's of 162 and Peacock, R.R. 4, Milton, 17 153. Runner-up was Clarence records, 149 and 133 BCA's.
