In the structure it enclosed the stone block of the former Methodist Church with year 1867. inscribed on the top rests the historic plaque which the Ballinafad Institute had made two years ago. This plaque has an outline of the history of the land on which cemetery, community centre etc. now are-on land first settled in 1820 and donated by that first settler of Erin township, Nathanael Roszel.

The cemetery presents a fine appearance this Sunday morning Sept. 3, 1972 and we who live at the corner really enjoy its beautiful lawn like appearance, for it had been freshly mowed by Mr. Ken Graham. Those, who have relatives resting there can feel quite complacent about it.
