

# Warden introduces Passport to Halton

"Know Your County" says Halton Warden Jim Swanborough introducing the program "Passport to Halton" at a special press luncheon in Milton Friday afternoon.

Sixteen places of interest in Halton have been selected and included in a special free passport. As each of the places is visited the passport will be stamped and the completed passport a souvenir of the program.

A new publicity wrinkle, the county is operating the Passports to Halton program for three weekends this fall. Exact dates are Saturday September 30, Sunday, October 1, and Saturday, October 7 and Sunday, October 8, Monday, October 9 and Saturday and Sunday, October 14 and 15.

Not familiar "It is surprising to find that even the older residents of the various places in Halton are not that familiar with the complete make-up of the county," the warden told media representatives at the luncheon.

"I'd like to think that during my term of office that I at least did give you the opportunity to know your county."

"Your interest will make this project a real fun program for families, groups and various organizations," Swanborough said, as he urged Halton people to fill out an application for a free Passport to Halton.

"Why visit places like Muskoka during the colorful autumn days when we have so many beautiful attractions right on our

doorstep?" he said noting the object of the program is to familiarize residents to existing scenic, historic, industrial and recreational attributes of the county and to develop a pride and interest in things in Halton.

Free distribution of Halton passports will be made to residents and families on application to the Warden's office. The passport will have a map and location of passport stamp centres, which are

distributed through the seven municipalities of Acton, Burlington, Esquewaux, Georgetown, Milton, Nassagaweya and Oakville.

The Warden explained Jack Carpenter, of Acton, had been retained by the county to help promote the Passport to Halton idea. Carpenter said the shortest route over the 16 places of interest would cover about 90 miles. It could be covered in two days.

12. Oakville—Oakville Historical Society
13. TOWARF Rescue post
14. Oakville—Sheridan College
15. Burlington—Central Library
16. Burlington—Canada Centre for Inland Waters.

## Council OKs arena repair

As recommended by the Parks and Recreation committee, council agreed to arena repairs amounting to \$16,960 Tuesday. Less the budgeted amount of \$4,000 the remaining total estimate is \$12,960.

Breakdown of figures shows \$8,500 for reinforcing the west wall; \$5,360 for new wall cladding if considered structurally necessary; \$1,000 for engineering fees and \$4,000 for inspection of the total building.

The recommendations follow an engineer's inspection which indicated high winds could affect the safety of the structure.

Question report Deputy-reeve McKenzie and councillor Greer both questioned the new report, with councillor Coats explaining it now included a study on wind and snow tolerances. The earlier engineering report had assumed the building was originally built

to withstand wind and snow. Councillor Marks pointed out the building codes have changed since the arena was built. Mr. Hurst added the engineer was highly recommended. The work had been approved at committee level and forwarded to council and the motion passed with little discussion. Work will begin right after the fair, said councillor Chapman, and should be done before the Lions dance there.

The village was without electricity for approximately two hours and a quarter.
