During the summer, the Georgetown Y Judo Club separated from the Y, due to lack of space and instructors, and developed into the Georgetown Y Budokan Judo Club.

Bill Doherty, who is a third degree Black Belt, was engaged as instructor, and the Rose Room was leased from the Georgetown Recreation Commission.

Cleanup and painting began September 2. Further plans include a permanent mat area of 600 to 800 square feet, installation of a sound system, partitioning of change rooms, and improved lighting.

Non-profit . . . The organization will be run on a non-profit basis. Judo instruction will be available to all juniors and seniors in North Halton, and no Junior will be refused participation due to lack of registration funds or Judo uniform. Eventual membership of 300 is anticipated.

The room and facilities will be offered to other organizations in North Halton on a cost basis.
