Ebenezer U.C.W. started the fall work with a program based on "Friends." Plans were discussed for the ploughmen's banquet and the auction sale, which is planned for Sept. 29, at Brookville Hall.

Mrs. Early and Mrs. A. Norrish were the conveners. Mrs. Weideman read the scripture. Mrs. Norrish dealt with Rhodesia, from the study book. There are 224,000 whites and four and a half million Africans. \$300, is spent on education annually for a white person, while for a black it is \$30. Why Africa? Garth W. Legge says, "There are many Africans. It is 5,000 miles long, and 5,000 miles across at the widest part. There are nearly 40 newly independent countries. Africa's problems are our problems. Having reached the moon, we haven't reached one another. Missionaries work under native leaders. Race prejudice is in its most virulent form in South Africa and Rhodesia. A race war has already begun in Southern Africa. The problem of the gap between the rich and the poor nations is a vexed one."

Announce grant for Hilton Falls dam

Approval of a provincial grant of \$855,000 to the Halton Region Conservation Authority for the completion of construction of the Hilton Falls Dam and Reservoir was announced jointly by Leo Bernier, Minister of Natural Resources, and Halton West M.P.P. George Kerr this week.

The dam is located in the Township of Nassagaweya, off No. 5 Sideroad. It is to be an earth dam with a concrete conduit providing the necessary outlet works. A minor diversion from

the 16 Mile Creek is also required to facilitate the operation of the reservoir for flood control and low flow augmentation purposes.

The Authority anticipates future development of the areas adjacent to the reservoir for multiple uses including forest management and fish and wildlife conservation and limited recreational development.

All member municipalities are designated as benefiting and will bear the Authority's share of the cost.
