Sunday's trek was a four mile performance which started off at 10 a.m. from the Cedar Grove Lodge in Waterloo and finished off at the same place about 2 p.m. It had been a glorious ride through beautiful countryside on a bright sunny pre-autumn day, with competitors coming in from every area of southern Ontario along with a few from Michigan, U.S.A.

Driver of the car, Tom Pinder, 29 Inverness Dr., Guelph, was treated and released from hospital and two passengers in the car, Richard Roadnight and Leroy Stumpf, both of Rockwood, also escaped injury.

Travelling west on Highway 7 towards Rockwood, the car had spun and struck the pole from the rear after which the driver continued on down the highway for an approximate distance of 3 1/2 miles of a mile from the accident scene.

The car burst into flames and the fire department was called. Estimated damage to the '66 Ford, valued at \$800, was complete write-off. Charges are pending.

## Gordon Gray's sudden death shocks Rockwood, district

The community of Rockwood was deeply shocked last Friday, September 8, when Gordon Kenneth Gray, the father of one of its well loved families was found lying beside the grader on which he had been working on an Eramosa Township sideroad. Taken to Guelph by ambulance it was disclosed that he had suf-

fered a severe heart attack. Monday's funeral service, held at the Wall Chapel in Guelph, was a tribute reflecting the tremendous respect and esteem with which the township residents held the stricken family. An overflow of friends gathered at the funeral hall requiring the necessity of an

extra room. After the service, conducted by Rev. Don Sinclair of the Rockwood Presbyterian Church over 50 cars were in the procession to the Village Cemetery for the interment with Walter Swanston, Arnold Duffield, Cecil Meredith, Keith Hamilton, Barclay Forsythe, Bert Pinkey and Jack Alton acting as pallbearers.

Community-oriented, Gordon Gray, was a member of the Rockwood Lions Club, an ardent angler, a member of the Triangle Fishing Club in the Village. He was a member of Rockwood Presbyterian Church.

Gordon worked on the road maintenance crew of Eramosa township for the last seven years as a grader operator.

He is survived by his wife, the former Jean Marie Kirby, daughters Carolyn (Mrs. William Wingate), Wanda, Janice and Sandra, all of Rockwood, one granddaughter Heather Anne, his mother Mrs. Viola Gray, brother Edward of Toronto, Walter of R.R. 4 Guelph and Glen, R.R. 1,

Rockwood, three sisters, Mrs. W. King (Muriel), R.R. 4 Guelph, Mrs. R. Girling (Phyllis) of Simcoe and Anna Dale, R.R. 1, Rockwood. He was predeceased by his father Walter Gray.

## Charges pending Sunday collision

Charges are pending for a 4 p.m. Sunday collision which involved two Rockwood area residents and a family from Georgetown.

The accident occurred when a '68 Chev driven by Michael Cummings of 7 Durham Street, Georgetown, collided with a '65 Ford driven by Allison Martin of R.R. 5, Rockwood.

Driver of the Martin car was proceeding north on Eramosa 25th side road and concession 3, towards Oustie and had, as its passengers, 9 year old Peter Martin, the driver's son, and her mother, Bernice Bacon of Main

Street, Rockwood.

**To hospital**  
Mrs. Martin was treated for head cuts and released from the Fergus hospital. Peter and Mrs. Bacon were hospitalized with face and body lacerations with Peter later released Tuesday afternoon.

Passenger in the Cummings vehicle, 3-year-old Christina was also treated and released with little injury.

Both cars are alleged write-offs with the Georgetown vehicle valued at \$2,000 and the Martin automobile set at \$1,800.
