Farm Management - fourth, Paul Stewart; ninth Dave Reid; 16th, Grace Bird. Field Crops - fifth, Lorne Wilson; eighth Ken McNabb; 17th Dennis McClure; 22nd Paul Stewart. Total score in the competition - seventh Ken McNabb; 13th Paul Stewart; 21st Lorne Wilson; 24th Grace Bird.
