Esquesing Council has received word from the Department of Municipal Affairs that the township's official plan may be approved any day.


No ice forecast


In past years balmy October temperatures have delayed ice installation until late in the month and sometimes early November.

ACTON TOWN HOUSE DEVELOPMENT
