Although it is not fair to rap Team NHL as a whole for gross misbehavior on the ice during the Canada-Soviet Union hockey series, I can't let the event slip by without publicly expressing my disappointment in many of the players our youngsters have been encouraged to look up to.

Take Phil Esposito for instance — a great hockey player who's living up to his advance billing with excellent two way play, but not one I would particularly recommend as a guest at a minor hockey banquet. His soliloguy criticizing Canadian fans for non-support following the game in Vancouver rivalled some of Shakespeare's, but was without justification I believe.

If Esposito was shocked at the booing by fans in the Pacific Coliseum, it must have also crossed his mind that perhaps a few of them and the international TV audience turned a little red when he gave one of the referees the "Choke" sign, after receiving a penalty for an obvious infraction. It was clear that he chopped Soviet star Valery Kharlamov down on the play, as if he were the last piece of firewood during the cold season in the Yukon.

Just in case you missed what you thought might have been an innocent little hand to the throat motion, Esposito gave a disgusting encore performance just before he served a four minute sentence in Sunday's game in Moscow for ramming one Soviet player into the boards and cross-checking another. Now really, what was he expecting—a standing ovation?

Since he feels free to publicly express his discontent with game officials whether they deserve it or not, there's no reason why he should question the fans' right to voice displeasure over a team's ineptness when it is so obvious as it was in the Vancouver game.

The team's failure to shake hands with their conquerors following the first game in Montreal was inexcusable and unfortunately the two players who had an opportunity to be shining examples of good sportsmanship passed it up. Red Berenson and Ken Dryden, two players with previous international hockey experience received mild praise because they at least made a motion to skate towards the Soviet players. They would have been unparalleled ambassadors of good will if they'd completed their duty, instead of following the rest of the team into the dressing room like a couple of sheep.

Apart from desperation tactics like Frank Mahovlich's attempt to sit on top of Soviet goalie Tretiak when he was caught out of his crease in the fourth game and the typically belligerent (they also do it in the NHL) play of fringe players like Wayne Cashman and Bill Goldsworthy, I was particularly distressed by the childish antics of Gary Bergman and Peter Mahovlich after what admittedly was an error on an offside call by the referees in Sunday's game. Bergman, who was in the penalty box at the time jumped to his feet and appeared to come mighty close to striking the penalty timekeeper with his right arm and the younger Mahovlich heaved his stick out on to the ice from the Team NHL bench. All this energy was wasted foolishly, when it could have been used to mold a more impressive Canadian victory than the 3-2 win that was small consolation for the two thorough beatings the Soviets administered in Canada.

The sad part of the series from my point of view is not that Team NHL. lost some games, but the bush league manners they displayed in losing.

Educational and documentary program producers are always looking for prime TV time to display their work and if they haven't considered it yet, I suggest they run programs opposite the Wednesday and Saturday night NHL games this winter. If Team NHL players are going to keep up the same nonsense, it might be wise for us to discourage our youngsters from watching it.

An even better idea would be to cancel the entire NHL schedule this year and let each of the teams train for a year and practice the impressive Soviet style of play.

Wouldn't we all have something to look forward to the following year -- 14 teams playing a superior brand of hockey, free from the roughhouse garbage the NHL has condoned during the last decade.
