Waterloo-Wellington Minor Hockey League officials have agreed upon a reduced schedule for this season, probably in the 16 la game area.



The league schedule is expected to get underway the final week of October or the first week of November.



Switching her presentation to Eramosa township, Mrs. Barnes described a house on the Farries property as "one of the prettiest neo-classic Gothic vernacular I have seen". She said the Farries connection with the property dates back to 1846 and claimed no amount of money will salve the hurt that Ontario Hydro is doing by crossing their property. In Erin township, Mrs. Barnes

said present owners of property and buildings at Lot. 2, Con. 4 have spent 10 years repairing and restoring an old house there. She said 12,000 trees have been planted in front of the house Woodlands. the Improvement Act. The Ontario Hydro right of way passes within 20 feet of the house, she said.
