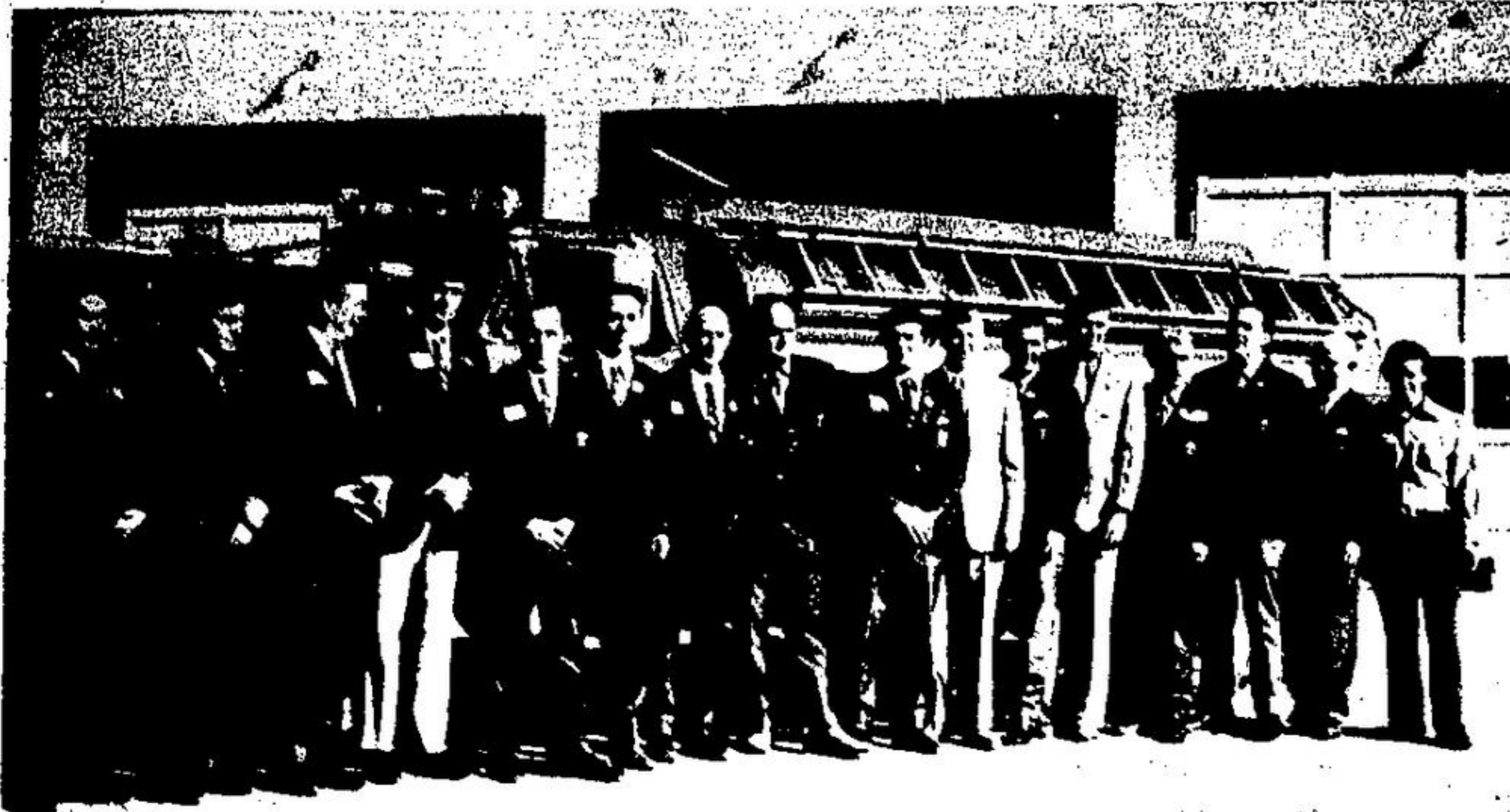
Work is progressing on an addition at the rear of Limehouse Presbyterian Church. A turkey supper is planned for Wednesday evening there.

Two Scottish teachers were among the visitors this summer. They had been teaching their students in Scotland about Canada, and made arrangements there to stay on a Canadian farm before touring to the west coast and down into the states.

The Federation of Agriculture contacted the Freemans to ask them to host guests from Switzerland who are considering setting up a similar scheme

there.

Italian and American guests also enjoyed a few days' holidays in this unusual way as well as Canadians. The Freemans have enjoyed meeting them all very much, they say.

Although some farm visit exchange programs have not worked out too well, with lack of available farms, the Freemans have had a very satisfactory experience with the plan.
