
Slim Trim

# ACTON YOUTH Council executive members

Plan third walkathon for deaf Sat., Oct.14

Saturday, Oct. 14 is W-Day in

north Halton.

On that day hundreds, maybe thousands of young people will be walking the roadsides in the Acton-Milton-Georgetown area in hopes of raising funds to help send Canada's deaf athletes to the 12th World Games for the Deaf in Sweden next July.

Halton and Peel Association for the Hearing Handicapped Is organizing this, its third annual walkathon, Mrs. G. B. Clements, R.R. 2 Milton is walkathon chairman and a host of helpers from the Association are assisting her with details.

Bob Angell of the Royal Canadian Legion is handling arrangements for the walkathon in Acton-including patrol cars, food, information and entry forms for walkers. He reports more donations of food would be helpful and donors should deliver them to the Legion Hall. Mr. Angell can be reached at 853-0427.

Start either place

As with the two earlier walkathons, the walkers can start from either Acton Community Centre in Acton or Martin St. Senior Public School in Milton. The route is the same for each group. Milton walkers will walk along Steeles Ave. to Hornby, north on Seventh Line to Silvercreek, west on Highway 7 to Acton and south on Highway 25 back to Milton. The walkers from Acton will follow the same route. only starting and ending at Ac-

Refreshment booths will be set up along the route at five mile intervals. Official patrol cars will be on the road throughout the day to pick up anyone if necessary,

and Milton's St. John Ambulance vehicles will also patrol the roads. Radio communications is being handled by the Oakville

REACT group. All walkers are being urged to line up their own sponsors, to sponsor them at a set amount per mile completed. In previous walks about half the starters went the whole 30 miles, and the average collection was \$15 to \$17 per walker. The 30-mile trudge usually takes anywhere from six to 12 hours to complete.

Quit at 7p.m. The Oct. 14 walk starts at 7 a.m. and no one will be allowed to keep walking after 7 p.m. that evening, Mrs. Clements pointed

This year the HPAHH hoping for increased participation from public, high and separate school students in the north Halton area, because the participation from Ontario School for the Deaf in Milton will not be as large as in previous years. More and more OSD students are returning to their home towns for the weekends, Mrs. Clements sald. The Association is also encouraging associations for the hearing handicapped in other communities to sponsor walkathons, so many of the OSD students who walked in earlier fund-raising efforts here will be walking in their home communities this year.

### 65 to Sweden

Next June the Federation of Silent Sports in Canada is planning to send a team of 65 athletes plus coaches, managers, interpreters and chaperones to Malmo, Sweden for the two-week World games for the Deaf. About

25 to 30 of these will come from Ontario.

Walkathon organizers have contacted students in Acton and Milton High Schools, Holy Rosary Separate School in Milton, and Martin St., Denyes, Dick, Kilbride, Fairview, M. Z Bennett, Robert Little. Limehouse, Brookville. Stewarttown and Speyside Public Schools to let students know the details of the Walkathon. More walkers are invited and any adults wanting to get in on the fun are welcome too.

The association has set an age limit of 10 years (or grade five) and any walkers below that limit must be accompanied by parents.
