Ask Sabres to minimize Sunday aft. home dates

Acton Junior Sabres have been asked by Acton parks and recreation committee to attempt to schedule no more than approximately 25 per cent of their home games for Sunday afternoons this year.

The committee is making the request in hopes it can revert to the policy of holding family public skating Sunday afternoons at 2. Last year public skating was held after 4 p.m. on Sundays and the committee attributes a large amount of lost revenue to this.

Following considerable discussion at their Thursday night meeting, committee members voted unanimously in favor of a Barry Inscoc sponsored motion asking the Sabres to minimize their Sunday home dates and stagger them week about where possible.

Tanners played home games Friday nights, participation was good and public skating still thrived on Sunday afternoons.

Mrs. Spielvogel reminded Marks the junior team has a problem with many of their players who hold down Friday night jobs.

"Yes there are six or seven in that category," Inscoc offered.

Chairman Chapman said he felt more people are served by public skating than by hockey.

Meanwhile, Sabres face the problem of getting league officials to alter a schedule that has

already been drawn up. The addition of an eighth team, Grand Valley last week may help that situation though. Other teams in the league are Acton, Fergus, Shelburne, Alliston, Bradford, Schomberg and Stayner.

Coach speaks
Sabre coach Bill Dawkins, who has been taking a look at prospects in early season workouts in Guelph has his views on the Sunday hockey situation.

"I hope we can come to a reasonable agreement with the board. It is difficult for some of our players to make Friday night

games," he said. "Personally I'm not against Friday night hockey, except for that reason."

"There should be a convenient hour set aside for public skating, but it should not be done so as to eliminate a form of recreation for another group of people," he suggested.

Dawkins maintained that if youngsters want to skate they'll skate anyway, even if it's a Friday night and that parents will come with them.

He feels the committee could better analyze their loss of public skating revenue last season.

"I think we provided more recreation with that team than the recreation committee, provided the entire town of Acton last winter," he concluded.

Sabres will hold their next workout at Guelph Memorial Gardens on Thanksgiving Day afternoon at 1.30.

Tie Breaker
Chairman Orval Chapman's tie breaker vote allowed a stronger motion by Peter Marks that the team be asked to schedule a maximum of approximately 25 per cent of their home games on Sundays to carry. Marks, Ian McGillivray and Gil Malcolm supported the motion. Inscoc, Diane Spielvogel and Ted Pratt opposed it.

Inscoc expressed the opinion the Sabres and recreation committee should work together and try to alternate Sundays between hockey games and public skating.

He pointed out that junior hockey provides recreation for spectators as well as players and went as far as to forecast a situation here similar to Georgetown.

"We may get to the point like them where most ice time is booked up. They have public skating only about once a week," he said.

"We'll just forget that fella," Marks interjected.
