Eramosa Council dealt with the following matters at their regular meeting Monday night:

—Clerk Lloyd Hindley was instructed to arrange a meeting, if possible, with the city clerk of Guelph and the township solicitor during the latter part of October to discuss licensing by-laws.

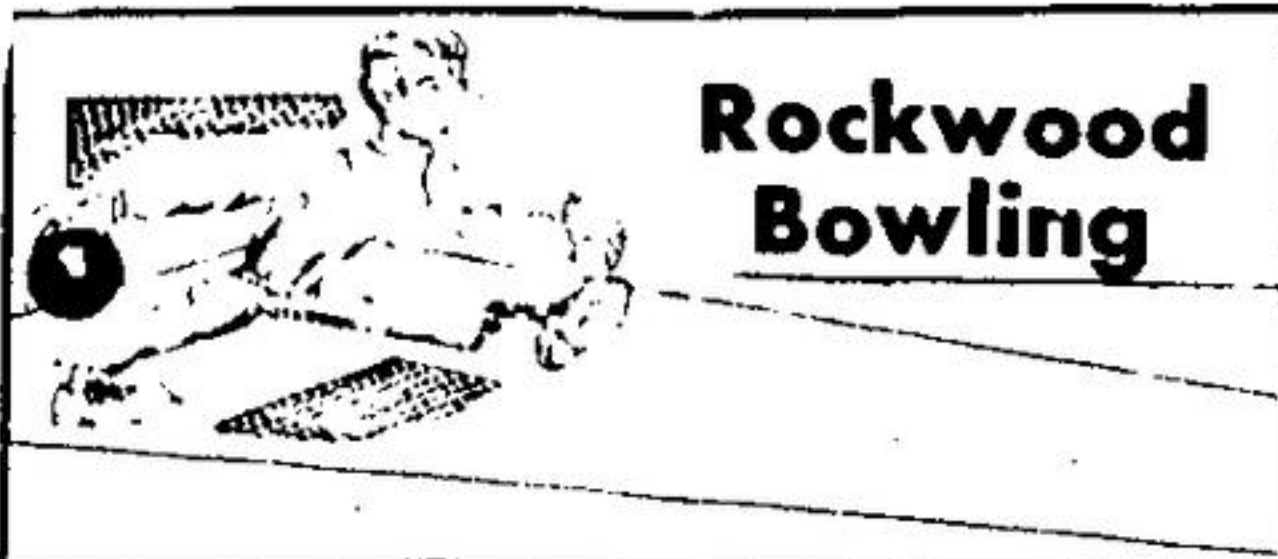
—The roads committee reported that 31 applications had been received for the position of grader operator and that they had narrowed the choice down to eight applicants. An interview is to be held with the eight applicants tonight (Wednesday) and a recommendation made to council.

—The clerk was instructed to write the Grand River Conservation Authority requesting the decision of the appropriate board made on the reconstruction of the dam at the former Harris Woolen Mill.

—Council decided to have "Dead End" and "No Dumping" signs erected adjacent to the property of Dr. Hopkins.

—Council sympathized with a request by Mr. and Mrs. William Ritchie to authorize a building permit which would allow them to build a storage building for whitewash trucks, but decided they would have to adhere to the township by-law.

—Council decided to accept an extension of Jackson St. in Rockwood of 460 feet easterly as an unopen end road allowance and agreed that they would be agreeable to Elmer McCannell building the street to such standards as he may require for a private access road at the present time. Mr. McCannell is a representative of the Rockwood Lime Company.
