

1972 **ASSESSMENT**

Upon Which 1973 Taxes Will Be Levied Changes in the Assessment Act provide that the assessment

made in 1970 for taxation in the year 1971 will not be changed until the year 1974 for taxation in the year 1975 except as follows: "No Amendment shall be made to the assessment or collector's roll by reason of an increase in value to land because a building has been erected, altered or enlarged until the increase in value is at least in the sum of \$2,500 at market value, or, if the assessment in the municipality is at tess than market value, at an equivalent value." Assessment notices will not be malled to the owners and occupants during the month of September as is usually the case. Appeals may be made against the 1970 assessments at any time up to October 31 in any year.

Assessment notices will be sent out where there is, an increase in the value of the property as set out above. Appeals may be made against such supplementary assessments during the period of time which will be stated on the notice.
