No change in county apportionment

No changes in the method of calculating Halton's county apportionments for individual municipalitles will be processed, for this year at least.

Georgetown Reeve Rick Morrow started a move to have figures for assessment purposes updated. In his speech at county council a month ago he pointed out the figures used for county apportionment were two years old and would not reflect the growth in any specific town for the previous year.

Consider your horse's health

The fall is an excellent time to give consideration to your horse's health in preparation for winter and next summer use. Of particular interest at this time of year is the control of internal parasites (bots, etc.),


The most common type of bot found in the stomach of horses in southern Ontario is the magget of the fly Gasterophilus intestinalis (bot fly). To determine if your horse is infected, carefully examine the hair of the front legs, chest and under the chin for the tiny white fly eggs (during summer and fall). These maggets which grow in the tongue and stomach may cause ulcers and pain, resulting in the horse refusing to eat.

Treatment The use of an internal drug against bots in the stomach is recommended four to six weeks after the first substantial frost.






