

Charles Templeton claims

Only Liberals can run Canada

In one of the finest politically timed oratorical efforts to be staged in Halton riding this election campaign, writer-broadcaster Charles Templeton told Halton Liberals why he felt that party should win on Oct. 30 and why that party's leader was the only one of those running who could handle the country's problems and challenges in future years.

Describing the Social Credit Party as being dead, the NDP as a struggle and self-righteous and the Progressive Conservatives as unwilling to adapt to change, Templeton said the Liberals were the only party that could deal with the challenges in a radical, dramatic and courageous manner.

"Canada is unique in a variety of ways. It is difficult and almost impossible to govern. It is a strange conglomeration, not a melting pot like the United States. People tend to commit themselves to the Maritimes, Quebec, Ontario, B.C. or the Prairies where the needs differ from region to region."

He described the country as a ribbon 100 miles wide and 3,500 miles long. "It's as if someone jolted the map and everyone fell to the bottom."

Templeton impressed upon the Liberals that they should become involved and involve their friends in the election.

"This country is just beginning to feel its oats, to flex its muscles and sense its power. It is an exciting place to be but a tough place to run."

"Canadians have to decide who's best equipped to do the job." Templeton narrowed the race to one between Conservatives and Liberals, including the Social Credit and NDP could be spoilers but never form the government.

He rated the Conservatives as unable to run the country because of their general philosophy of conservatism and indicated their slowness to change and reluctance to make radical, courageous moves.

Nice guy
"Robert Stanfield is a nice guy but he can't run the country alone. Who would help him, Stanfield and who? Stanfield and Wagner, Stanfield and Hellyer, Perry Ryan—Stanfield and who? It takes a cabinet," Templeton pondered.

"The Liberal party is the party of reform. It is fundamental to the understanding that are wrongs, and there are deficiencies. Liberals see change as the essence of life, providing a climate where spirit of man is free to come to full flower. That is what Liberalism is all about and that is what this country needs."

"The country will make their decisions largely on the basis of the leader. Who would you deal with your problems, Pierre Elliot Trudeau or Stanfield? If separation becomes a horrendous issue who'd you rather have deal with it?" Listing other issues he felt would be potential problems in the future, Templeton noted commonwealth problems, negotiations with the president of the United States, and matters of world peace and indicated Trudeau would be best equipped to handle the situation in each case.

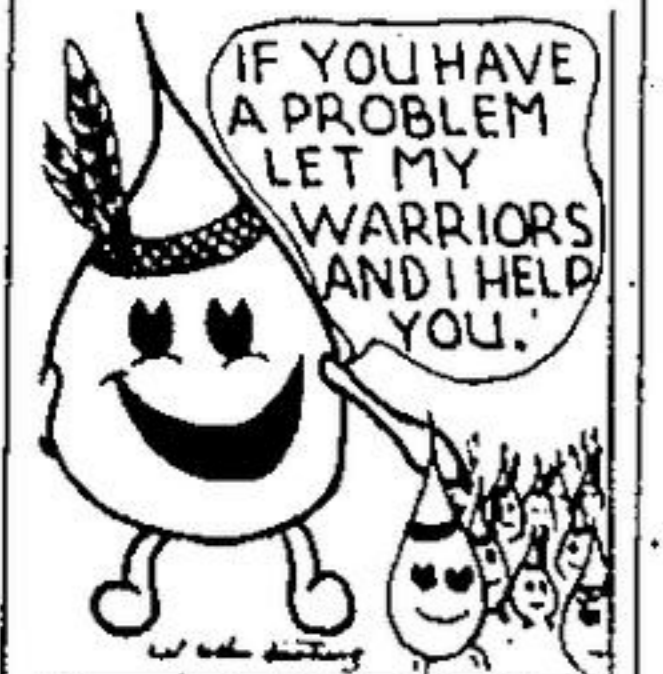
Safety award given to town

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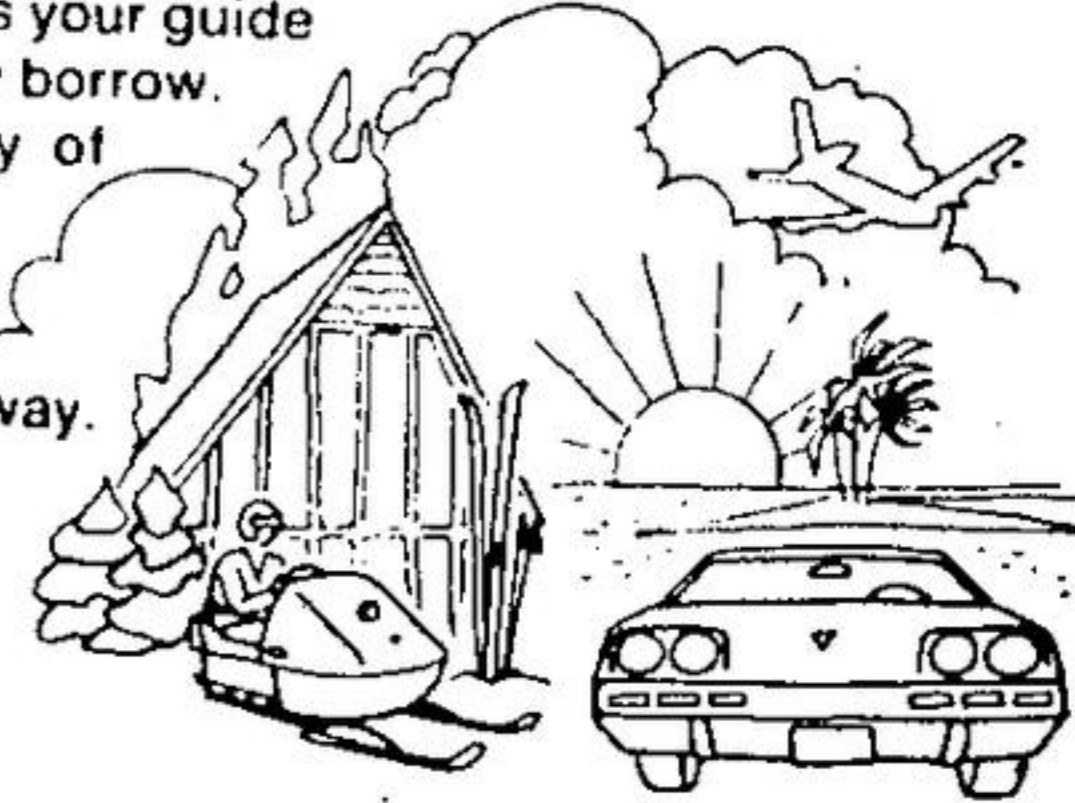
