Reeve warns residents

Reeve Tom Hill is cautioning all prospective township builders to seek pertinent information free of charge at the Esquering township offices rather than from real estate agents.

The reeve made the statement at Monday night's council meeting, after Cliff Dudley, a newcomer to the village of Glen Williams appeared to ask when Park St. in front of his new home would be opened. Dudley claimed the old Reesor survey of the village showed Park St., even though it is not open.

Councillor Dick Howitt suggested Mr. Dudley take the matter up with his solicitor or with the subdivider, pointing out the street is registered in the county registry as an unopened road allowance and that the responsibility to open it does not rest with council.

"There should be a law against it," a second man interjected, objecting to the misrepresentation.

"That's a provincial matter," Councillor Len Coxie replied.

"If you want any information, you don't go to real estate agents, you come to this office and it won't cost you any \$35 an hour," Reeve Hill roared.

The reeve turned thumbs down on another suggestion that a bulldozer now working in the area on road reconstruction might take a run past the house to clear a passageway. He pointed out there are hundreds of parallel situations throughout the township and if a favor is granted one resident it would have to be extended to all.

Music teachers form area group

The members of the Georgetown Trinity Teachers Association (G.T.T.A.) held a meeting on October 1, at the home of Mrs. D. R. Scull, the local secretary of Trinity College of Music, London, England.

Monthly meetings It was decided by the members of the G.T.T.A. that meetings will be held monthly with the objective of improving and making more interesting the musical education of students by further study and performance.

Recitals will be held throughout the year at which the honor students of each teacher will be eligible to perform.

Further matters of business were tabled for future meetings.

Slow payment

Halton County taxpayers are paying an additional amount of at least \$30,000 per year to unemployed workers, simply because the Unemployment Insurance Commission is taking far too long to get the claims approved and paid, according to Halton County Social and Family Services Director Jim Gray.

The Director told the county his department was having to pick up the tab for those unemployed who needed help and waited more than two months sometimes for UIC cheques. Gray said the problem was a costly one because the claimant collected twice, once from Family and Social Services and a second time from UIC when they finally sent through a lump sum.

Too long Gray cited a case where a man's claim had been approved July 23 and as of Sept. 20 he still hadn't received a claim and all UIC officials would say was that it would be another 10 days to two weeks at least.

Gray said the UIC people serving Halton were very cooperative and couldn't be blamed for deficiencies in the program, but rather the confusion and ineptness came as a result of over-centralization.

Gray said he had hoped the two departments could have reached an agreement whereby the municipalities could recoup monies invested on behalf of UIC at the end of the year, but felt no such agreement was to be forthcoming in the near future.

Upset Upset by the report, Esquering Reeve Tom Hill suggested he and the committee wanted to see quicker action on claims and noted he couldn't understand why it would take so long.
