county's population is enrolled in ago, said Emmerson Lavender, an elementary school and 8.8 per assistant director of education. cent of the total population Secondary schools have 17,659 attends a secondary school. students as of Sept. 30 and that Trustees noted the percentage of population enrolled kindergarten is stendily declining - from 2.2 per cent in 1966 to 1.5 per cent this year.

North area

Elementary enrolment in the north education area's 25 schools totals 8,802, down 12 students from the projections. There are 852 in kindergartens at 19 of those schools. In the north area there are also 254 enrolled in special education.

Secondary schools in north Halton area have 3,252 students enrolled - 535 in Acton, 1,724 in Georgetown and 1,021 in Milton.

This year the board has a staff of 1,304 principals and teachers in the elementary schools, for a pupil-teacher ratio of 24.99 to one. In the secondary schools, the ratio is 18.48 to one for the composite high schools and 13,53 to one in the special vocational schools. Secondary school full tune staff totals 980, including 176 in the north area.

Want drug discounts

Only drug stores offering discounts will receive business from Halton County Social and Family Services Department. Currently the department directs recipients of assistance from their department to buy at stores that have agreed to provide 25 per cent discounts.

Department director Jim Gray was instructed to ask county drug stores to advise the county what sort of discounts are available. Members agreed a list should be compiled of those offering discounts and recipients asked to shop there.

The current practice of using a few stores in the county has come under some criticism. While no major innovations were suggested, the new scheme will allow all drug stores a chance to purtake in the business.
