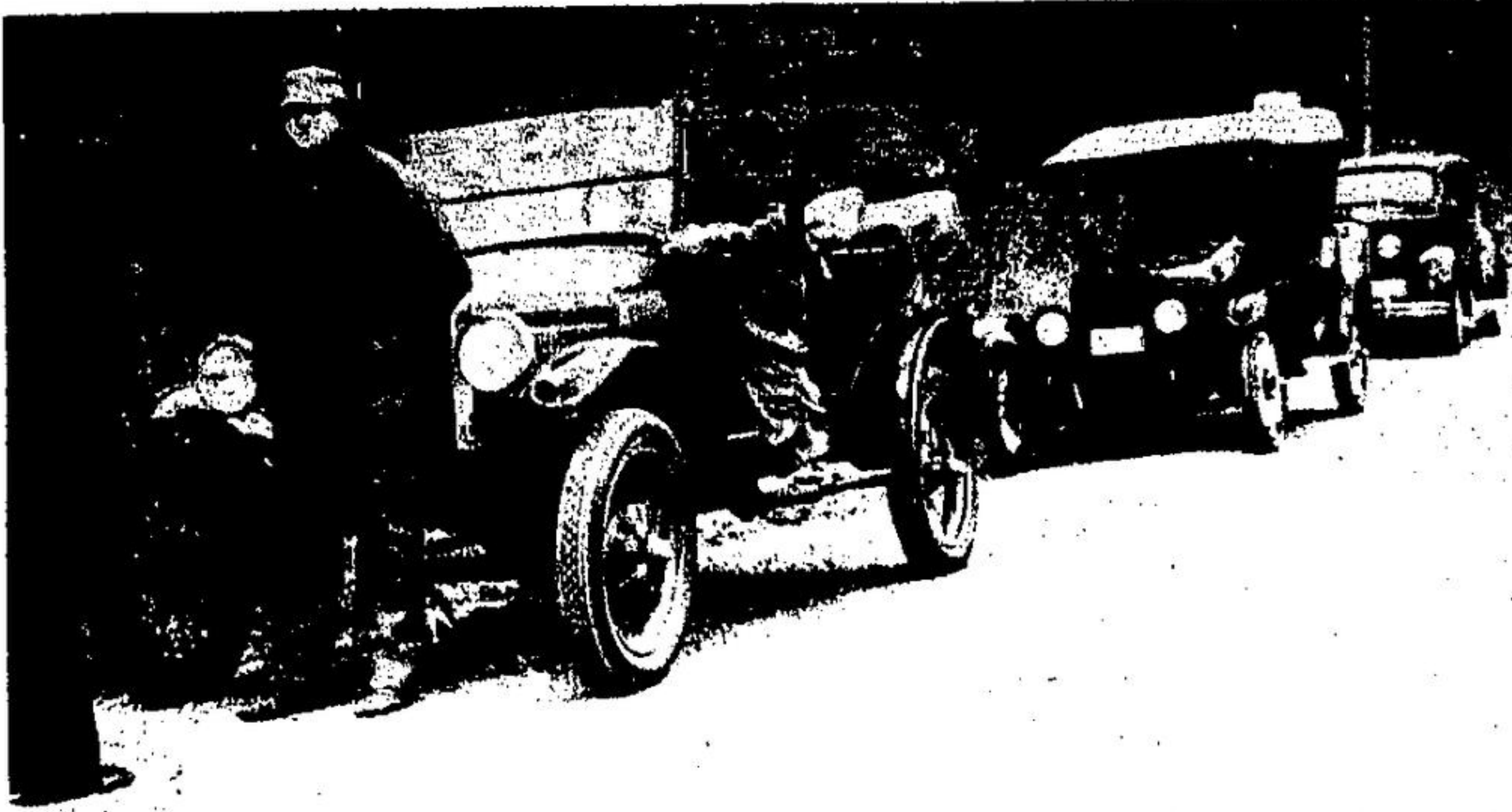


Limehouse

Almost quarter population enroll in Halton schools

There are 50,240 students attending elementary and secondary schools in Halton this year, and the students represent 23 per cent of Halton's total population of 197,496, members of Halton County Board of Education learned at their meeting Wednesday.

Elementary school enrolment is 32,581, down 100 from the projected enrolment and down 104 from the enrolment a year ago, said Emmerson Lavender, assistant director of education. Secondary schools have 17,659 students as of Sept. 30 and that figure was down 41 from

projections, up 997 from a year ago.

This year 16.2 per cent of the county's population is enrolled in an elementary school and 8.8 per cent of the total population attends a secondary school. Trustees noted the percentage of population enrolled in kindergarten is steadily declining — from 2.2 per cent in 1966 to 1.5 per cent this year.

North area
Elementary enrolment in the north education area's 25 schools totals 8,802, down 12 students from the projections. There are 852 in kindergartens at 19 of those schools. In the north area there are also 254 enrolled in special education.

Secondary schools in north Halton area have 3,252 students enrolled — 635 in Acton, 1,724 in Georgetown and 1,021 in Milton.

This year the board has a staff of 1,304 principals and teachers in the elementary schools, for a pupil-teacher ratio of 24.99 to one. In the secondary schools, the ratio is 18.40 to one for the composite high schools and 13.53 to one in the special vocational schools. Secondary school full time staff totals 980, including 176 in the north area.
