Eleven accidents

Three people were injured in a three-car accident in the Sixth Line north of Five Sideroad Saturday, report Milton OPP. It was one of 11 collisions to occur in the North Halton area patrolled by Milton OPP during the week of Oct. 15 to 21. The eleven collisions involved 17 vehicles and caused injuries to 11 people. Property damage was estimated to total \$14,680.
