Coxe shoots for deputy

# Miller will challenge Hill

The imminence of regional government has failed to discourage prospective candidates for this December's municipal election in Esqueping township where a race for the reeve's chair is already developing.

Deputy-reeve Russell Miller announced yesterday (Tuesday) he will challenge incumbent Reeve Tom Hill for the township's top office this December. Reeve Hill announced his intention to stand for re-election in September.

"I've made my decision because I feel the people of the township deserve a choice every two years," Miller said. "There are some things that could prove to be a benefit to the ratepayers which have not yet been done."

Hill said he hopes to be given the opportunity to guide the township into regional government.

"I've spent a lot of time on it already and I feel our township has received a pretty good shake on it," the reeve commented.

Deputy possibility Meanwhile, Councillor Len Coxe, who headed the polls in his first attempt at municipal politics in 1970 will step up and try for the position of deputy reeve.

"I hope to be able to keep things running smoothly. I don't want to see the township broken up under regional government," Coxe said in announcing his decision.

Freshman Councillor Dick

Howitt, who polled only seven fewer votes than Coxe in 1970 will run again for council. Howitt said he feels unable to move up and try for a higher position, because of the amount of time his Toronto law practice demands of him.

"I feel I can be just as effective as a councillor anyway," he said. The fifth and veteran of all township elected officials, Councillor Wilfrid Leslie was unable to be reached. However, all indications point to his running again.

Former candidate In a telephone poll of unsuccessful previous candidates, this paper found two former candidates who said there's a chance they may run and a third who admitted he is a doubtful starter but did not entirely rule out his candidacy.

Seventh Line resident Malcolm

Freeman, defeated by George Currie in a race for reeve in 1968 and again by Tom Hill for the same position in 1970, said he will not run for reeve but may take a shot at a seat on council.

C. P. "Pat" Patterson of Norval, a former councillor who lost his seat in the 1968 election, said he'll be watching the early negotiations very closely and that he could possibly be a candidate.

Another Seventh Line resident, auctioneer Ward Brownridge said he's a doubtful starter, although he is very much interested and would like to run. He said demands made on him by his business have increased in the past year. Brownridge was fourth in a field of six candidates for three council seats in 1970 and missed being elected by only 22 votes.

Among other unsuccessful 1970 candidates, Peter Horvath who placed last in the race for deputy-reeve said he will not be a candidate. Ken Marshall who gave up his council seat early to place second to Miller in the race for deputy-reeve could not be contacted.

Unsuccessful council candidate George Matley said he will not run this time, but will be lending support to certain candidates.

J. Edward How, also a 1970 candidate could not be reached for comment. Dave Craig, a member of the North Esqueping Ratepayers' Association, who was recently appointed to township planning board said stories circulating that he will run are false.

"Perhaps five years from now yes, but right now I'm too busy," he said. Election day in Esqueping is Monday, December 4, as it is in the rest of the province.

With the implementation of regional government for Halton possible by January 1974, the December municipal race for Nassagaweya Township Council may be a dull affair. The elected councillors could only serve a one year term.

All the municipality's present councillors, with the exception of Cal McIntyre, have said they will be seeking re-election. Councillor McIntyre said he would have to give the matter considerable thought before making a decision.

Four year veteran councillor Art Gibson said he was committed to running in the December election because "the present Council is probably best qualified to lead the Township into a regional government set-up."
