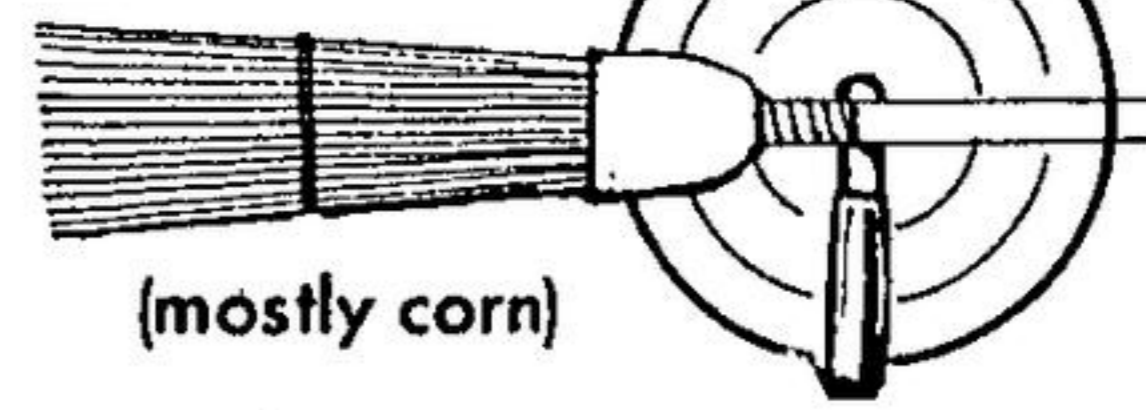

Sabres host "Green Machine" in league opener here Sunday

Games against the University of Guelph junior varsity squad in Guelph tonight (Wednesday) and back here at the community centre Friday night at 8.30 will provide a last minute tuneup for Acton Sabres and also allow co-coaches Bill Dawkins and John Goy to decide on their starting lineup for the '72-73 hockey season.

Sabres host the defending group champion Fergus "Green Machine" in their South Central Junior "D" league opener at the community centre Sunday afternoon at 1.30.

Opening ceremonies will include the official faceoff and the presentation of the Charlie Thomson Memorial Trophy. Mayor Les Doby, Halton M.P. Rud Whiting, newly-elected Halton M.P. Terry O'Connor and Halton West M.P.P. Hon. George Kerr have all been invited to attend the opening ceremonies.

Trophy origin  
The Charlie Thomson Memorial Trophy was donated to the Acton Parks and

Recreation Committee by the Legion Minor Sports Association in memory of Charlie Thomson, a popular minor sports worker who passed away last year. It is to be presented at the committee's discretion to a person, persons or organization making an outstanding contribution to recreation in Acton. Name of the first recipient will be kept secret until Sunday.

So far, manager Bob Marshall has signed only 11 players, defencemen Randy Weldon, Ted Harmer, Brian Davey and Brad Timbers, and forwards Dale Fisher, Pete Morrison, Gary Turkosa, George McPhail and John Sheppard, all holdovers from last year's team, along with newcomer forwards Bill McGiloway and John Snow.

Juvenile goalies Rick Bonnette, Ted Hagan and Steve Webster will likely work in the two exhibition games. Sabre officials have been in contact with two imports Mike Kreiner of Oakville, who played junior lacrosse here this summer and Art Moore of Scarboro a late cut of the Chatham Jr. "A" club, but neither contact has materialized. Kreiner has apparently won a spot with the Jr. "B" Oakville Blades and Moore has expressed little interest in travelling to Acton.

Coach Dawkins expects to sign more players, after assessing their play in the Wednesday and Friday games and is optimistic about Sabre changes this year.

Coach optimistic  
"We should have a better-balanced team than last year. The addition of Johnny Snow and Bill McGiloway will help round out the club and if we can get good goalkeeping, I think we'll be one of the most improved teams in the league," he commented.

"Unlike last year, we got an early start on workouts. The guys are working hard, they're responding well and we should be in much better shape to start the season. The players are hitting hard in practice and also showing they're able to take a few bumps," the Sabre coach added.

Fergus lost 11 players to overage but coach Paul Cook feels he'll be able to fill the vacancies.

"We've picked up John Cunningham from Erin and he's a big kid with a hard shot." Cook said in a telephone interview. "Randy and Sandy Fleming and Merv Griffin are back with us after attending the Guelph Jr. "A" camp and we've got Tom Broderick back in goal. He was sensational last year."
