Evaluate your farm now

Capital Gains legislation came into effect January 1 of this year. The introduction of the tax makes it necessary for a farmer to establish the value of all his assets as of Valuation Day, December 31, 1971. This appraisal will serve as a basis for calculating capital gain or loss when property is sold. It is not absolutely necessary to hire professionals to make appraisal. About 95 percent of

Ontario's farmers can complete their own evaluations, says L. E. Small, associate agricultural representative for Elgin County. An outline, Valuation of Farm Assets for Capital Gains Tax, December 31, 1971 has been prepared by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food to help farmers identify assets requiring evaluation and provide a convenient, permanent list of data for future reference. The

most important farm assets are the farm land, buildings, quotas and basic herds.

Fair market value
Owners of farms, rented land, or other qualifying property should establish a fair market value for their property and keep it with their records so it can be found easily. Capital gains or losses on the sale of most properties require a "V-Day" value in order to calculate the tax for the year of the transaction. Capital Gains tax will apply if the farm is sold at a higher value than it held on V-Day.

The appraisal should be related to at least three other properties of comparable value to justify the market value of your own holdings. Statements of opinion by self-styled experts, without this supporting evidence, have little value. It may be to your advantage to hire an accredited appraiser to calculate the market value of your farm. While it may seem costly, he will be able to supply you with accurate information and comparisons for arriving at your farm valuation. Appraisals with no supporting evidence will be impossible to

verify later. The comparison should be done in as much detail as possible, taking into consideration all important features of the farms. Check and allow for drainage, fences, access roads, condition of buildings, conditions of sale, etc. It is also beneficial to include photographs of the comparable holdings, as well as of your own farm, to help establish their V-Day condition.

The value of your basic herd should be established as soon as possible. It is simpler to get all the information now than search back through livestock records at a later date. For herds of high value, seriously consider having your herd appraised by someone knowledgeable in your type of livestock. Whether you do it yourself or hire a professional, farm evaluation is important and to your benefit.

The outline, Valuation of Farm Assets for Capital Gains Tax, December 31, 1971 is available at county agricultural offices and from the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food, Information Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto 182.



During the regular meeting on Tuesday, Oct. 24, Nassagaweya Councilors:

Decided to replace a wooden doorway on the north side of the municipal building with a metal frame one. Coe Construction, the firm expanding the township works garage, will do the work. Cost will be \$533.

New county flag promotes plow match

Halton is flying a new flag these days, a County of Halton flag specially produced to promote the International Plowing Match which this county will host in September of 1974. The brown, yellow and green flag is fluttering from flagpoles around Halton and more are available to those who want them, at the manufacturer's price. Halton's flag was the idea of Halton Warden Jim Swanborough of Burlington and Acton public relations man Jack Carpenter, who worked together on Halton's tent display at the 1972 plowing match at Sebringville. There, the flag fluttered atop the tent and inside displays were aimed at letting IPM visitors know more about the county and its plans to host

the match on the Craig Reid farm south of Georgetown, Sept. 24 to 28, 1974. Seven for now... In the centre of the flag is a honeycomb of seven hexagonal boxes, representing the five towns and two townships in Halton. Below is a stylized word "halton" (without a capital h) and along the right side are the figures "1974". Warden Swanborough jokingly figured the county could continue to use the flag when regional government arrives — by reducing the number of hexagons to three or four — whatever the case may be. The symbol was also used on the successful Passport to Halton program, a day-tripping tour through the county held on three weekends in early October.

In Esquesing

Leslie will run Marshall passes

Councillor Wilfrid Leslie has announced his intention to stand for re-election in Esquesing township this December. The veteran of all township elected officials says if elected he will continue his battle to have township roads brought up to a better standard. Former Councillor Ken Marshall, who placed second in a three-way race for the position of deputy-reeve in the 1970 election has confirmed he will not seek election in the township this year. Mr. Leslie and Mr. Marshall were unable to be contacted by press time last week and their decisions were not included in an article which polled township officials regarding their election intentions. So far, Reeve Tom Hill and Deputy-Reeve Russell Miller have declared themselves candidates for reeve. Councillor Len Cox has announced his intention to seek the position of deputy-reeve and Councillors Dick Howitt and Wilfrid Leslie

have said they will stand for re-election.

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
