

Day care questionnaire

Circulars on the need for day care centre in Acton were passed around the tables to Acton council members at their meeting Tuesday. Promoted by councillor Marks, the letters were prepared in the town office.

The questionnaires are to be filled in and returned to the town office to indicate if respondents would use such a service. Grants available Councillor Marks pointed out legislation is on the books for financial support of day care centres and would be available again from the federal government. Information must be collected before the town would apply for assistance.

The proposed centre would operate five days a week with trained staff. Fees would vary with those who could afford it paying the full fee. Financial assistance subject to a means test would be available. The full fee would be between \$15 and \$20 a week.

Apprehend

On Tuesday police apprehended youngsters who have apparently been letting air out of tires, and reported the incidents to parents. They have received six complaints of flat tires recently.

Three collisions

Three car accidents were investigated by Acton O.P.P. the past week.

October 31 Sam Tennant of Acton was slowing for a turn on Queen St. when his car was hit by another which left the scene. Damage to the Tennant car was estimated at \$100.

The driver of the other car, a Guelph man, was apprehended and charged on two counts on November 5. Damage to his car was estimated at \$250.

A minor collision in the Becker lot Nov. 1 was caused when a car was backing out of a parking spot. Drivers were Geraldine Harrington of Acton and Marlene Lourie of Owen Sound. No charges were laid.

On Nov. 5 Diane Spielvogel of Acton swerved to avoid another vehicle and her car struck Knox church steps. Damage \$30 to the steps and \$250 to the car. There was no charge laid.

Brothers charged constable hurt

Two brothers, arrested and charged Thursday night following a disturbance, appeared in court in Milton Monday and were remanded for a week.

Acton O.P.P. were called to a hotel where the disturbance was reported, and Cons. Bruce McArthur and Murray McCrae responded. In the attempt to break up the fight outside the hotel Cons. McArthur suffered a cut under one eye and bruises.

Brother objected An R. R. 3 man was arrested and charged with causing a disturbance by fighting and assaulting a police officer. The brother objected and was charged with obstructing a police officer.

The brothers were taken to jail in Milton and after seeing them lodged there Cons. McArthur went to Milton hospital for treatment. Two stitches were required to close the cut under his eye.

Adams owners knock town

A letter received by town council from Adams Knitting Mill was read at committee level, discussed and ordered filed.

Tuesday at the regular meeting councillor Chapman asked what the committee had learned from the letter.

Council had originally written Adams Knitting Mill following a report in the Toronto Star which indicated the Acton branch was closing due to a shortage of labor here.

Councillor Elliott explained the total blame couldn't be levelled on the shortage of labor, which council had doubted. Mr. Elliott said there were a vast number of things the owners didn't like about the town.

Various aspects had been criticized although Councillor

Marks pointed out the town could learn something from the criticisms.

Not misquoted Councillor Coats said he felt, after reading the letter, the Star had probably not misquoted the owners of the knitting mill.

Also criticized were local government, hydro, assessment, garbage collection, general calibre of labor and costs of labor. The mayor observed the mill had apparently expected concessions.

Marks eyes county seat

Councillor Peter Marks declared his candidacy for one of the county positions, at council Tuesday. He will be running for either the position of reeve or deputy-reeve of the town.

Incumbents are reeve Frank Oakes and deputy-reeve G. W. McKenzie, both of whom have

indicated their intention of running again.

"I want it known there will be a vacancy on council," Mr. Marks said, "and I hope we have a good slate."

Busservice Mr. Marks also reported to council that he will be bringing to the next meeting a proposal for public transportation. He is considering bus service to bring people downtown "for Christmas at least."

Reject estate plans

Plans for the establishment of an estate subdivision containing homes in the \$60,000 range on land occupied by Toronto International Drugway east of Acton have been rejected by Esqueving planning board.

Reeve Tom Hill said the plans were rejected because they were not endorsed by a recognized planning firm.

Reeve Hill confirmed a story that part of the plans called for the present drag strip to be used as an air strip for residents of the subdivision.

Ajax damage

Eighteen window panes at Ajax Engineering plant were broken by stones. The incident was reported to police Nov. 6 and is still under investigation.

Short change Terry by 50

Election figures for Poll 20 in Acton published in last week's Free Press shortchanged Terry O'Connor by 50 votes, it was learned this week.

The Free Press figures, none of them official, should have given Conservative O'Connor 75 instead of 25 votes in that poll.

Final results

Final results from the federal election in Halton riding show Progressive Conservative Terry O'Connor elected with 22,640 against 20,361 for Liberal Rod Whiting and 8,763 for New Democrat Carolyn Holstein.

Officials at the Halton returning office said 52,039 of a possible 62,715 voted for an 83 per cent turnout. There were 255 rejected ballots.
