Homemakers provide needed service

Georgetown branch of the Red Cross is again advertising for homemakers.

The purpose of the Red Cross Homemaker Service is to provide competent women to go into homes on a daily basis to care for the family while mother is ill at home or in the hospital, or in other emergencies, permitting the breadwinner to continue working, assured that the family life will be maintained

as normally as possible; to provide home assistance to senior citizens; to give assistance to the chronically Ill; to give service regardless of race, nationality, religious beliefs, political opinion or income.

Fees charged

Fees for this service are charged; however they are based on the family's ability to pay. Where the family can pay only part or none of the fee, financial

assistance may be obtained under the Homemaker and Nurses Services Act.

The Homemaker is carefully selected for her mature and stable personality and her good health. The Homemaker, while on duty, wears a Red Cross smock. Her responsibilities include care of children, planning and cooking meals, light laundry, light housekeeping and simple bedside care under the direction of a doctor or nurse.


