

Many arguments can be advanced in support of the selection of Howard Dwyer and Alan Hall as first recipients of the Charlie Thomson Memorial Plaque. But if there's anything that made their recreation contribution to the town of Acton outstanding, it has to be the consideration that they started with nothing and in the space of four short years created the town's most popular summer sports attraction.

The progress of other local organizations, although every bit as important seems small in comparison, when you look back to the summer of '67 when the only place young boxla players had to try out their shots was the brick wall at the north end of the high school and the Acton arena was attracting only a few stray mosquitoes on Monday nights.

By 1971 there was a Bobby Turkosz and a Mike Marcoux. Instead of pounding the north wall of the high school, they were filling lacrosse nets with goals and putting Acton back in the provincial sports limelight as O.L.A. Junior "C" champions. And the mosquitoes no longer had any fear of losing their way. They couldn't get into the arena for people, when the Rams tangled with Brockville in the championship series.

There were many obstacles to hurdle in between, most of which would have caused men with even an ounce less love for the game to say "What's the use?".

Lack of financial backing sports organizations are used to starting the season with necessitated an annual blitz of merchants and businesses, one which was carried out largely on the soles of Howard's and Alan's shoes. There was equipment to buy, floor time to be rented, promotion to be arranged, players to be transported. Then there was the frustration of trying to sort out instructions from the O.L.A. which sometimes changed two and three times a week and that of counting the empty seats on the players' bus when the team travelled out of town to play powerful Junior "B" opponents like Niagara.

It's all history now and the Rams are here to stay. Howard and Alan have made sure of that too by laying the foundation for a promising minor lacrosse program, which flourished this summer under the generous sponsorship of the Acton Rotary Club.

But without Howard Dwyer and Alan Hall there probably would be no Rams, let alone a provincial championship. "West of Georgetown" and "near Guelph" would have increased in popularity as expressions to describe the location of a town that deserves better, a group of teenage boys might have turned their pounding from the high school wall to more sensitive targets and it's certain 500 people would be sitting around wondering what to do on a summer Monday night.

Bowling leagues resume


