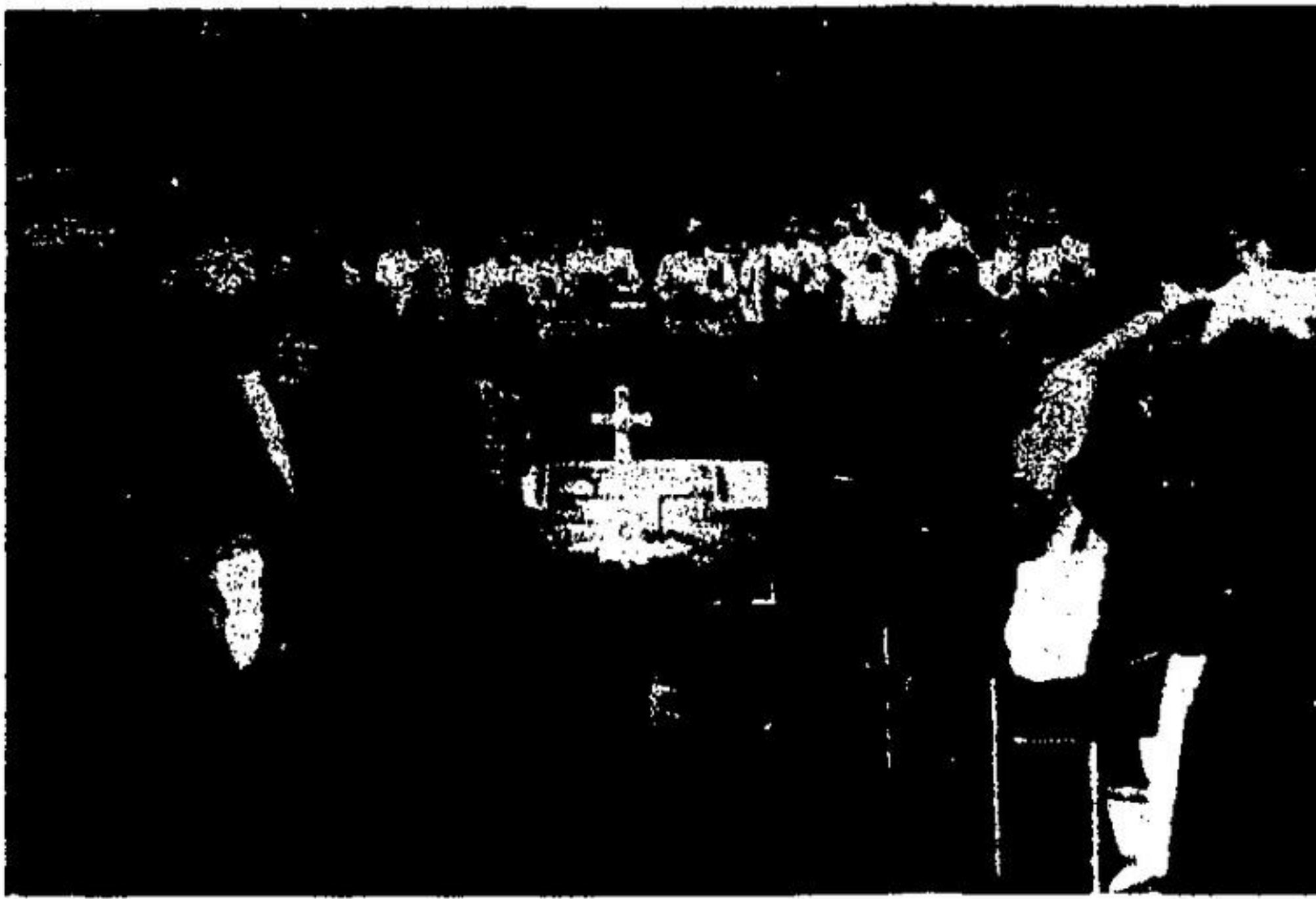
Recreation program
