The rest of the two day meeting was held at Hillfield-Strathallan Colleges, Hamilton. Christian Education was the subject of a 3-hour session on Friday afternoon.

In other work, the Synod considered the current state of church union negotiations with the United Church of Canada, and was presented with white papers on Restructuring of the Diocese and on Christian Initiation. These papers will be the subject of lengthy study and discussion during the next 12 months.

During Synod, Bishop Bagnall paid tribute to Malcolm Evans, who recently resigned as director of planning and programs, and welcomed Rev. Larry Reese as the new director, as well as a number of other clergy who are new to the diocese. There was also an address by Rt. Rev. S. K. Patro, Bishop of the Diocese of Bhopal in the newly-formed Church of North India. Bishop Patro, in the Hamilton area on a goodwill visit sponsored by Presbyterian, United, and Anglican Churches, was ordained a priest in the Anglican Church of India in 1949.
