Reeve Warren Parkinson was unopposed in his bid to stay in as reeve of Eramosa Township for another term. Councillor Bill Adsett threw his name into the hat as well as for deputy reeve but later withdrew to defend his seat on council against five other contestants and the reeve's chair went to Mr. Parkinson by acclamation.

There will also be a race for the deputy reeve's office with present deputy Duncan McPhedran, a veteran of the ballots, being challenged by newcomer Donald Gordon.

The three council seats are being contested by present councillors Bill Adsett and Ken Fair with Betty Lou Clark, John Hewitt, George Major and former deputy-reeve Jim Milne, supplying the opposition.

Councillor Dick Strong, who earlier indicated he would again run for office, declined due to business reasons.

So Eramosa will have an election for deputy reeve, council and the liquor question as well as contests in Rockwood and Eden Mills for trustee posts.

Yosef Drenters receives grant

Yosef Drenters of Rockwood was among recipients of grants totalling \$228,536 from the Canada Council for projects to make Canada's cultural heritage better known.

Mr. Drenters received \$500 to prepare a book on William Wetherald, founder of the Rockwood Academy, one of Ontario's first secondary schools. Mr. Wetherald was born in 1820 and died in 1898.

The well-known Rockwood sculptor and artist recently returned from England where he continued his research into William Wetherald's early life.
