Machine shop is "desirable"

A proposal by Stuart Robertson for a machine shop at the rear of his property on the east half of Lot 1, Con. 7, Eramosa township, near Crawsons Corners was termed "desirable" by the township planning board, but members of Eramosa council want to see a plot plan of the property before giving final stamp of approval.

Councillors earlier declared they favored an operation such as Mr. Robertson proposed by Councillor Bill Adsett declared he was worried about a "strip" developing along this part of the township. He noted there were several businesses along the road all of them furnishing out on 7 Highway, which may affect traffic plans of provincial authorities.

The Committee of Adjustment turned down the request for the machine shop because it was not a variance but a zoning change, although they felt it was desirable and a well sheltered location. They sent it to planning board who in turn endorsed it.

Councillor Dick Strong said it was his opinion council should be looking overall properties before making final decisions and see a site plan before making a motion.

Mr. Robertson proposes to

repair farm implements and perhaps indulge in some light manufacturing on the site.

Explains new tax credit

Eramosa clerk Lloyd Hindley returned from a meeting of clerks and treasurers in Brussels well informed on the Ontario property tax credit system which goes into effect in 1973.

He told the Free Press there is a basic \$90 credit right across the province to which can be added 10 per cent of total property tax paid and then deduct one per cent of the taxable income. The balance represents the tax credit the home owner or tenant will receive to a maximum of \$250.

The Ontario property tax credit may be claimed by all individuals resident in Ontario on December 31, 1972.

Clerks and treasurers at the meeting suggested to the representative present from the Ministry of Treasury, Economics and Inter-Governmental Affairs that if 1972 taxes were not paid by December 31, the tax credit should not be granted.

Eramosa council briefs

At the November meeting of Eramosa Council:

—Council advised Mr. Watson he would need a minor variance to build a small barn to keep a few ponies on his Seventh Line Property. Mr. Watson has eight acres, two below the minimum, without a variance.

—A letter from Grand River Conservation Authority advised the Authority intends to rebuild the dam at the Harris Woolen mill under the winter works incentive program.

—A large puddle at the corner of Inkerman and Guelph Streets was brought to council's attention by school principal Grant McRae, who explained the difficulties students at the Rockwood school had during wet weather crossing the street. Council asked road superintendent Bob Hamilton to look at the road and possibly fill in the puddle.

—Filed a proposal from the town of Whitby which would have asked the provincial government to assist municipalities in repairing and constructing arenas. Another resolution from the town of Pembroke asking for stricter censorship of books, movies and T.V. programs was also filed.

—A letter from the Ministry of the Environment advised the Department acting on a complaint about alleged pollution from the White Tanning Co. at R.R. 4, Rockwood, had investigated and found no evidence to suggest waste water from the tannery ever found its way into the Eramosa River. However, it was discovered that the waste water treatment method needed improving. The company was notified and improvements are nearing completion. The Department advised council they did not

anticipate future waste water problems at the plant. They could find no evidence of pollutants on the stretch of river at Lot 11, Con. 2.

—Council read and passed law regarding the Liquor Licence Act.

—Council made no objection to moving a sawmill owned by G. Harwood from the present location on the east half of Lot 21, Con. 4, to a spot nearer the barn. The owner hopes to curb vandalism by moving the mill.

—Discussed the purchase of

four lots in the village of Rockwood adjacent to the ball park, where facilities could be expanded. The clerk was instructed to enquire about cost of the property.

Reeve Warren Parkinson presided for the five hour meeting.

100th birthday for doctor

Mrs. Max Milne and Mrs. Ethel Craig, of Rockwood, returned Friday evening by North Central Airlines after spending several days in St. Paul, Minn. While there they were guests of Mrs. Martha Holman.

They were among the many guests who honored their uncle Dr. Walter R. Ramsey on his 100th birthday. They also had the pleasure of going through the Children's Hospital that was founded by Dr. Ramsey, the art building and library, and many other places of interest.

Dr. Ramsey received many gifts. One that he appreciated most was a picture of the home where he was born in Canada.

Dr. Ramsey's request was granted that just one inch below his portrait be printed: he felt that he had received enough credit and that it was time now to give credit to those who were doing such a good job carrying on his work, so the following appeared in the St. Paul Pioneer Press:

"St. Paul's first pediatrician celebrated his 100th birthday Wednesday, November 8. Dr. Reeve Ramsey, founder of the St. Paul Children's Hospital, and the first area physician to specialize in treatment of children, was honored with a mayoral proclamation, designating Wednesday, Doctor Reeve Ramsey Day.

Poll villagers on annexation

Councillor Dick Strong reported to Eramosa Council that he attended a meeting regarding the proposed annexation by Wellington County of that part of Eden Mills which lies in Halton County.

He reviewed the history of proceedings this far, noting a petition was circulated among Nassagaweya residents in the village asking if they wanted to be annexed. Some had objected. It was proposed to poll them and find out why.

Eden Mills sits on the borderline between Halton and Wellington, 300 acres and 204

residents in Eramosa, and 200 acres and 127 residents in Nassagaweya township.

Children in the village are split along school boundary lines, some going to classes in Rockwood and others to Acton. It is hoped that by some form of annexation the village will be reunited and taxes and children will all gravitate in the same direction.
